MINING DEVELOPMENT.

F. H. Osgood, of Seattle, Investi-
gating Bonded Property.

F H Osgood, of Seattle, who has
bonded the Chauncey Dale property in
the Blue River mining district, ar-
rived down from the camp this morn-
ing, on his way home. Mr Osgood
has been doing development on the
property with a view to establishing
its depth and permanency, to the end
that he can determine future opera-
tions. It is generally conceded that
this property has bright prospects, but
until some depth is attained, Mr Os-
good will not feel justified in placing
a mill on the property. However, he
will proceed with the work of driving
tunnels and before long hopes to be
able to place an estimate on the work-
ing value of the mine.

Mr Osgood took to the district with
him a mining expert who carefully
looked over the ground, and while Mr
Osgood has nothing definite to say re-
garding the mines, he is very well sat-
isfied with prospects so far. The
activity of the Blue River district con-
tinues unabated, and is a source of
satisfaction to Lane county, and to
Oregon.
