An Important Ruling.

On Monday the supreme court rendered a decision on the constitutionality of the law passed by the legislature permitting district attorneys to present information in criminal cases without a grand jury being called or an indictment being had, and proceed to try a criminal case upon such information.
The case just decided was that of the State of Oregon vs Harry Tucker, who was indicted in Union county for the crime of "burglary not in a dwelling." He was tried before Judge Robert Eakin, found guilty, and having been sentenced, appealed to the supreme court. In affirming the judgment of the lower court Justice Wolverton, writing the opinion, gives an exhaustive discussion of the question as it relates to both the state and federal constitutions.
The opinion sets up the fact that it is no violation of the constitution to deprive a defendant of an examination by a grand jury, and that thereby no rights of the defendant are jeopardized provided a trial is had before a jury in open court. This decision establishes the validity of the law.

WILL FIGHT AGAIN.

Men of the Second Oregon Will Enlist for China Service.

The Spanish war veterans are ready for another fight. The boys of the Second Oregon, who performed such gallant deeds in the Philippines, are now anxious to get on the main land of the Orient. Captain R S Huston, of Company A, has received letters from a number of the Second Oregon boys, residing in various parts of Lane county, asking to be included in a call for volunteers from Oregon is issued. In addition to this many of the volunteers residing in Eugene have stated that they will again enlist.
There seems to be a peculiar fascination in army life to induce the boys to wait another chance at it. Their trip to the Philippines was filled with many hardships, but there was enough satisfaction in it for compensation. During the late encampment at Salem many of the volunteers in camp stated freely that they were ready for enlistment if troops are to be sent from this state to China.
The men from this state have a record to be proud of and if troops are to be sent they will have a good chance.
