It was with difficulty that we could beat them off before casting clear. And they squeaked in a horrible manner as we rowed away.

A few hours later the Gothenburg City went to pieces.

A Floral Nosebleed.

Why speak of the lovely painted trilliums, with their three daintily crinkled petals, streaked with rose purple? Says Bradford Torrey in The Atlantic. One after another I gathered them (pulled them, to speak with poetic license), each fresher and handsomer than the one before it till the white stems made a handful.

"Oh," said a man on a hotel piazza as I returned, "I see you have nosebleed." I was putting my hand to my pocket, wondering why I should have been taken so childishly, when it came over me what he meant. He was looking at the trilliums and explained, in answer to a question, that he had always heard them called nosebleed. Somewhere, then—I omitted to inquire where—this is the "vulgar" name. In Franconia the people call them Benjamin's, which has a pleasant Biblical sound—better than nosebleed, at all events—though, to my thinking, trillium is preferable to either of them both for sound and for sense.

The Traces of the Beasts.

On every side in the Malay wilds the traces of the beasts—which here live as secluded, as safe from molestation, as did their ancestors in pre-Adamic days—are visible on tree trunk, on beaten game path and on the yielding clay at the drinking places by the hurrying stream. Here a belt of mud nine feet from the ground shows that an elephant has rubbed his itching back against the rough bark of a tree, and, see, coarse hairs are still sticking in the hardened clay. There a long sharp scratch repeated at regular intervals marks the passing of a rhinoceros. Here again is the pad mark of a tiger, barely an hour old, and the pitted tracks of deer of all sizes and varieties surround the deeply punched holes which are the footsteps of an elephant.—Blackwood's.

NOTICE TO WOOD SAWYERS

Requirements and Penalties of Ordinance No. 342.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons owning or operating any steam wood saw within the city limits to LEAVE or cause to be left any deposit of SAWDUST, or other litter upon the street, alley, or sidewalk within the city limits of Eugene.

The person or persons operating such wood saw are hereby required to immediately remove any and all sawdust, or other litter deposited upon any street, alley or sidewalk by such steam wood saw.

Sec. 2. Penalty for the violation of section 1, NOT LESS than \$5 nor more than \$10 and costs.

Sec. 3. Any person, firm or corporation having their wood cut or sawed by hand upon any street or alley shall immediately remove, or cause to be removed all sawdust or other litter from such street or alley.

Penalty for the violation of section 3, not less than \$5, nor more than \$10 and costs.

"Resolved, That the marshal be and is hereby instructed to make personal inspection each and every week of the streets, alleys and backyards in the business portion of the city, and see that the provisions of ordinance No. 106, approved January 2, 1890, are strictly enforced."

NOTE—Ordinance No. 106 provides for the prevention and removal of nuisances, and prohibits the throwing of straw, rubbish, or filth of any kind into the streets, alleys or backyards.
