The Street Car Line.

The street car meeting held in the
city hall Saturday evening was one of
extreme interest to the community. W.
H. Dennis, owner of the road, placed
the matter squarely before the people.
He is a busy mining man, and has
not the time to personally attend to
the road. He will do all that is possi-
ble to improve the road if the people
want it continued and will aid in hav-
ing the power changed to electricity
and the line extended to Springfield,
but thinks that to make a success of
the undertaking, the people of Eugene
should take stock in the enterprise.
Otherwise he will tear the track up,
and use the rails in his mines.

It will cost about \$40,000 to build the
road to Springfield and equip the same.
At the regular meeting of the council
in September the matter will again
come up and it is to be hoped that
something can be done. Such an ex-
tension would prove of value, and it is
more than probable that such a road
would be a dividend paying property.
