His Last Invention.

It Failed Like the Rest to Do Its Work.

Ralph Gordon strode moodily up and down his workshop, which was littered with the odds and ends of machinery which represented the ruins of a hundred castles in the air. He was always inventing; was Gordon; always spending days and nights over the manufacture of some wonderful machine or other which was to revolutionize the world and make him famous, only to find after all his labor some irreparable flaw in his plan which rendered the completion of the machine an impossibility or prevented it working.

He gazed around him on the gaunt skeleton in wood and brass of past hopes and clutched his hand fiercely. "A failure! Everything in my life is a miserable failure!" he cried aloud as he paced the floor.

Agassiz at the Saranac.

The whole Saranac community was on the quiver, says W. J. Stillman in The Atlantic, not to see Emerson or Lowell, of whom they knew nothing, but Agassiz, who had become famous in the commonplace world through having refused not long before an offer from the emperor of the French of the keepership of the Jardin des Plantes and a senatorship if he would come to Paris and live. The head of the deputation, after having carefully compared Agassiz to the engraving, turned gravely to his followers and said, "Yes, it's him," and they proceeded with the same gravity to shake hands in their order, ignoring all the other luminaries.

NOTICE TO WOOD SAWYERS

Requirements and Penalties of Ordinance No. 342.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons owning or operating any steam wood saw within the city limits to LEAVE or cause to be left any deposit of SAWDUST, or other litter upon the street, alley, or sidewalk within the city limits of Eugene.

The person or persons operating such wood saw are hereby required to immediately remove any and all sawdust, or other litter deposited upon any street, alley or sidewalk by such steam wood saw.

Sec. 2. Penalty for the violation of section 1, NOT LESS than \$5 nor more than \$10 and costs.

Sec. 3. Any person, firm or corporation having their wood cut or sawed by hand upon any street or alley shall immediately remove, or cause to be removed all sawdust or other litter from such street or alley.

Penalty for the violation of section 3, not less than \$5, nor more than \$10 and costs.

"Resolved, That the marshal be and is hereby instructed to make personal inspection each and every week of the streets, alleys and backyards in the business portion of the city, and see that the provisions of ordinance No. 106, approved January 2, 1890, are strictly enforced."

NOTE.—Ordinance No. 106 provides for the prevention and removal of nuisances, and prohibits the throwing of straw, rubbish, or filth of any kind into the streets, alleys or backyards.
