ANOTHER GERMAN STRAW.

Des Moines (Iowa) Leader.

Col Joseph Elbroeck, editor of the Iowa State-Anzeiger, who advocated Palmer and Buckner in 1896, both on the stump and in his paper, announces this year he will give his support to Bryan and Stevenson. Colonel Elbroeck is a strong sound money man—none stronger in Iowa, and no man has been more courageous in the cause. But he is convinced that free silverism is no longer an issue—that there is scarce a possibility, even if Bryan were elected, that the monetary standard would be threatened. So believing and being uncompromisingly opposed to the administration's imperialistic policy, he has gone back to his old party and will give it hearty support.

A GIRL'S ESSAY ON BOYS.

At a recent school examination for girls this composition was handed in by a girl of 12: "The boy is not an animal, yet they can be heard to a considerable distance. When a boy hollers he opens his big mouth like frogs, but girls hold their tongue till they are spoken to,

and then they answer respectable and tell just how it was. A boy thinks himself clever because he can wade where the water is deep. When the boy grows up he is called a husband, and then he stops wading and stays out nights, but the grown-up girl is a widow and keeps house."

Forestry Agent Johnson says that 400,000,000 feet of timber is consumed annually in the state of Oregon for fire wood. Portland burned 137,797 cords of slab and cordwood last year. The Southern Pacific, which burns wood exclusively on its Oregon lines, consumed some 90,000 cords alone last year. The Blue Mountain wood camps out 15,000 to 20,000 cords each, annually. This wood finds a market in Baker City, La Grande, Walla Walla, and even Idaho. The steamboats on the Columbia and Willamette rivers consume enormous quantities of cordwood and keep a small army of men employed in furnishing it.

P. Tecumseh Sherman, son of the late William T. Sherman, has bolted the republican national ticket. He states he is opposed to the reelection of President McKinley because of the treatment accorded the soldiers during the Spanish war. He says he cannot support an administration that was responsible for the privations suffered by the regulars and volunteers in Cuba. Mr Sherman has other grievances which influence him in not supporting Mr McKinley for reelection. It might be well to add that the Shermans and General Miles are relatives.

Los Angeles is the first of the western cities to experience the inevitable shock that always follows the completion of the census reports, and the fall is a hard one. From a claim of 120,000 people the figures go tumbling down to 99,650, which is nearly 6000 less than were reported in the special census taken two years ago.
