BLUE RIVER ROAD

Substantial Improvements Must
Be Made.

A JUST DUTY OF LANE COUNTY.

Eugene is awakening to commerce.
The question of building a good and
substantial road to the Blue River
mining district is being agitated, and
before any interest is allowed to cease
the funds should be arranged for and
the work begun.

A proposition is now on foot to
expand the sum of \$5,000 on the road
from Eugene to the district. If this is
done it should be made into one of the
best pieces of road in the county, and
one over which the heavy trafficking of
the district could be safely carried on.

Messrs C M Young and G W Griffin
started out today with a paper seeking
the encouragement of the business
community, and will also present the
matter fairly to the board of county
commissioners. As stated yesterday
the Lane county court has pledged
\$5,000 to assist in building a road to the
district from Brownsville, and Lane
county must act once or lose thou-
sands of dollars worth of trade. It is
believed the business men will assist
an enterprise fraught with so much
benefit to themselves, and aid in the
development of the county.

The Lucky Boy company, which
alone and unaided spent about \$7,000
in building six miles of road to its
property from the main traveled road,
states that it is still out for road build-
ing and that if the county court of
Lane county and the business men of
this city will raise \$4,500 it will add
another \$500, making a total of \$5,000
for the improvement.

NEW MINING DISTRICT.

Is On a Direct Line With Blue
River and Bohemia.Messrs Strachey and Partridge have
just returned from their group of ten
claims in the new McKenzie mining
district. They have left two of their
party to make further developments.
The gentlemen are well pleased with
prospects so far and expect to attract
much interest in that section. The
new district is west of the Blue River
Creek and on a line with the Fall
Creek and Bohemia mining districts.

The claims are about six miles in a
direct line from Wycoff's, on the Mc-
Kenzie, but these gentlemen went in
the last time from Thompson's and
cut a trail along the Martin ridge for
18 miles up to their camp. These gen-
tlemen have located a group of ten
claims, all showing well-defined ledges.
One of these they have opened on the
surface, the ledge showing a face 300
feet wide. The rock is of good charac-
ter, and indicates that much can be
expected from the further development
of the property. The active develop-
ment of these claims will continue,
and if the expected values are shown,
a five-stamp mill will probably be put
in this fall.

A number of other parties are locat-
ing in this neighborhood, and the find-
ing of ore formations here only indi-
cates what has long been suspected,
that the entire range of mountains has
mineral ores of good values. That this
section will be one of the mining
centers within a comparatively short
time, is now more than ever apparent.

The instructors secured are among the
very ablest in the state. The course to
be given follows the State Course of
Study, and includes several high
school branches.

of all teachers and the teacher owes it
to the profession to attend and take
part in this institute. Every effort
will be made to instruct and entertain
the teachers in attendance. Good
music both instrumental and vocal will
be a daily feature of the exercises.

A number of the leading educators
of Oregon will speak on topics of in-
terest to all. All teachers and friends
to the public schools cordially invited to
be present during the institute.
