THE GERMAN VOTE.

The New York World has been interviewing representative Germans in various parts of the country regarding the attitude of that class of voters in the coming campaign.

The following replies came from Chicago:

George Meyer, editor of the *Frei Presse*—I believe that the majority of German-American voters will vote for Bryan and Stevenson, not because they are for 18 to 1 but because they believe that in perils and trusts are more important issues just now than the money questions. You will find that Carl Schurz will come out for Bryan this year.

Christian Meyer, lawyer and member of the Chicago school board—I think that a very large percentage of the German people see no harm in the silver plank of the democratic platform and will support that party because of its stand against imperialism. My statement is based upon utterances I have heard from many people, including a number of republicans.

Jacob Ingthorn, lawyer, civil war veteran and chairman of an association of 340 German societies—There will be a big landslide among the Germans toward Bryan. Anti-militarism and anti-expansion are the leading issues. The flirtations of our country with England during the past year have estranged the Germans from the republican party. They do not like the attitude the government has assumed toward the Boers. The Germans believe that this country should help to maintain republics wherever they exist.

William Vocks, lawyer, republican stump speaker in every presidential campaign since 1864—Things appear to be badly mixed. Some of my friends who have always been republicans look upon the monetary issues as less perilous than the dangers of militarism and imperialism. They do not approve the republican policy of subjecting to our dominion islands of another hemisphere populated by a heterogeneous and semi-barbarous mass of people. Others still regard the silver craze as dangerous. I doubt whether any fairly correct prognostications can be made just now.

The following replies come from Indianapolis: Ferdinand Seineke, editor of the *German Telegraph*—The Germans are opposed to the new conquest

policy of the republican party; they were the original anti-imperialists. They oppose militarism, which receives the staunch support of the large capitalists who control the McKinley party. They denounce McKinley's pro-Anglo policy, which the Boer question brought forth so conspicuously. If the question of imperialism can be made the paramount issue, and the fear of free coinage can be dissipated a majority of the Germans will vote for Bryan.

Frank T. Edenharter—It is impossible for any one to speak for the Germans as a class. There are many among my acquaintances who voted for McKinley in 1896 on account of the money question, and who have not changed their views on that question, who will not vote for him this year because of their opposition to imperialism. Carl Schurz, I think, is fairly representative of the sentiment among his countrymen and many of them will be influenced by his attitude.

The St. Paul Globe, one of "democratic papers" that is against Bryan this year, is the property of J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern railway. Mr. Hill is a "democrat" who is opposed to the building of the Nicaragua canal, or of any other enterprise, or of any other enterprise or industry that would lessen the value of his railroad interests. Mr. Hill cannot be blamed for this, but the American people would be a set of fools to vote as Mr. Hill does and to oppose those who are known to be "offensive" to Mr. Hill and men of Mr. Hill's class. Mr. Hill is a big man but Mr. Bryan is nearer a friend and representative of the people's interests than Mr. Hill and his St. Paul Globe.
