SIUSLAW RIVER.

Progress and Condition of Public Improvement.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—The annual report of Captain W. W. Hart, of the engineer corps, who is in charge of a part of the river and harbor improvements in Oregon, has been received at the war department and made public, although his estimates for the coming fiscal year are withheld until they have been approved by the secretary. Captain Hart does not deal with the largest projects of the state, but reviews the progress that has been made in the past fiscal year on those works coming under his control.

SIUSLAW RIVER.

Hale & Smith, of Portland, secured the contract for extending the north jetty at the mouth of the Siuslaw river, and commenced work in November, earning \$8724 during the year. But slow progress was made, owing to the great depth of water, due to recent scouring, which rendered operations difficult. Considerable difficulty is anticipated in extending the jetty, as it is expected the current will continue to scour at the bottom as fast as the jetty is extended. At present 95-foot piles are required. When the work has been completed the channel is expected to take a more southerly course than at present. The depth of the channel now varies from 8 to 24 feet across the bar at high tide, the average depth being 17 feet. A vacant tract embracing six acres of public lands near the mouth of the river has been temporarily withdrawn from sale, as it contains stone suitable for jetty work, which is to be used in the improvement. The government also anticipated purchasing the Point Terrace quarry near by. The balance on hand will permit the building of the jetty for 200 feet, but further appropriation will be necessary to extend the jetty the additional 500 feet desired. Four thousand, three hundred and eleven dollars is now on hand.

A THRILLING ADVENTURE.

Dr McAllister Comes Nearly Taking His Last Ride.

Dr. E. A. McAllister has returned from a trip to Florence, Unipqua, Coos, Marshfield, Coquille City and Ten Mile. He made the entire distance on a bicycle.

In crossing Ten Mile Creek, located between Siuslaw and Unipqua, he had an experience he will never forget. He plunged into the creek carrying his bicycle, the tide coming in. He sank down to his neck and dropped his wheel; the next wave was more powerful and he was completely submerged and choked by the salt water and he also found that he was in quick sand. By herculean work he recovered the wheel. The wild waves continued dashing over him. Finally he placed the bicycle in an upright position and rested upon it. After a time he began to make a little headway toward the shore, but only by inches. When in a few feet of the bank he sank in about three feet of the treacherous sand again, but he had sufficient strength to reach a limb of an old drift sticking up. By resting on his wheel he wrote a few words to his wife saying his body would be found in the bed of the stream. After this he gave out completely and thought he was lost.

He reclined over against his bicycle and passed into unconsciousness. When he awoke it was 11 o'clock at night and he had been washed to the boat, and he got out in a hurry. He thinks the wheel saved his life. He was in the creek from 6 p. m. to 11 p. m. It was a thrilling adventure.

E. L. MIMS GETS NO NEW TRIAL.

Supreme Court Affirms Judge Lowell's Refusal to Grant a Rehearing.

Pendleton, E. O.

The supreme court's decision in the case of E. L. Mims, convicted for manslaughter, refuses a new trial, and affirms the judgment of the lower court, Judge Lowell sitting. The opinion is by Wolverton, J. The sentence was for five years in the penitentiary. He has been in the county jail here since the trial, which resulted in his conviction, last fall, in the hope that a new trial would be granted by the supreme court. Being convicted of manslaughter, although charged with murder in the first degree in killing J. Henry Miller, if a new trial had been given, he would have been tried only for manslaughter, and could not again been tried for murder.

The Mazamas.

This office is in receipt of a folder announcing the seventh annual outing of the Mazamas to Mount Jefferson from August 6 to 20. On Saturday, August 11, 1900, the society will hold its fifth annual conference on the pinnacle of Mount Jefferson, 10,867 feet above the Pacific ocean, the object and purpose of which shall be to initiate new members, take observations and securely enter its record book. The society has a membership of 230 and its annual outing is eagerly looked forward to and is enjoyed in every sense. Those intending to make the trip this year should be in Albany, the starting point, on August 6th.

BOOTH, KELLY CO.—Carpenters are at work fixing up the temporary quarters of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co's head office in the room formerly used by Starr & Aya. The floor will be covered with linoleum. The safe was placed in position this forenoon, and weighs 800 pounds, and is owned by J. H. McClure. It is an old Tilton & McFarland one. It was purchased in New York City by the late J. B. Underwood in the 60's, shipped to Portland by sailing vessel and hauled to Eugene with a four horse team. It cost Mr. Underwood about \$1,000. Mr. Underwood had as high as \$50,000 in the safe, and Mr. McClure said he had carried as high as \$20,000 in it for a month or two.

The steamer Eugene was sunk several days ago at Risley's Rocks, between here and Oregon City. She is lying with her decks completely inundated, and preparations are making by the Willamette River Towing Company to float her.

This is not the first time the Eugene has met with an accident. Her record is one long series of mishaps. She made an unsuccessful attempt to reach Fraser River, Alaska, but was much worried by her battle with the waves. Of late she has been converted into a steam barge.

This is not the steamer City of Eugene, formerly owned by Eugene people.
