DISCOURAGING.—Thirty-five acres of summer-fallow wheat was threshed on the Mathew Wallis place, west of Eugene, yesterday. It averaged 5 bushels, machine measure; 20 acres of oats made 8 bushels per acre. James Yates threshed a field on the I S Logan place, which was finely summer-fallow, and it yielded between 6 and 7 bushels. On an average year these two pieces of land should average 25 to 30 bushels per acre. The farmers are greatly discouraged. Some of the threshermen are refusing to thresh only their own crops, as they cannot make expenses at present rates.

LICENSED TO PRACTICE.—At the annual meeting of the State Board of Medical Examiners, held in Portland, the following were among those granted license to practice medicine and surgery in the state of Oregon: Joel C Booth, M D, of San Francisco; Frank J Van Kirk, of Minneapolis, Minn. Dr Booth at one time attended the U O, and Dr Van Kirk has located in Eugene for the practice of his profession.

Fire Last Night.

About 10 o'clock last night a general alarm of fire was sounded and the department quickly turned. The fire was in a residence on Seventh street, near Williamette, owned by Jerry Ream of Albany, and occupied by O C Zeigler. The fire was put out with all possible speed, but considerable damage was done to the building. Nearly all the contents of the building were removed to places of safety.

The building was insured in the Alliance company, Geo F Crow, agent for \$500, and the furniture was insured in the Aachen-Muehl company, Goldsmith Bros, agents, for \$500.

There is apparently no question about the fire. It was incendiary. At one corner of the building a hole about six inches square was found, and some matches and paper told a story of their own.

This is the third fire which Mr Zeigler has had within a year or so. First his barn was burned and with it he lost two horses and a delivery wagon. On Thursday night of last week fire was found in the pantry of his residence but was extinguished, and the services of the department was not needed. The house contained but little furniture, a bedroom suite or two and a few other articles else all might have been saved from the fire of last evening.

This matter of incendiarism should be looked into rigorously and if possible the guilty party hauled up. Such affairs do not tend to make the citizens of a town feel safe regarding their property while it is known that there is a fire bug in their midst.

This afternoon Marshal Brady and Policeman Croner discovered papers saturated with coal oil under the floor, that by some means did not burn. This proves conclusively that the house was set on fire in the basement. Mr Zeigler says he left the building between 6 and 7 o'clock that evening, and carefully locked the house.

The Worm Pest.

A worm that is doing much damage in various portions of this state, has invaded western Washington also, and may spread all over the coast. No one can tell "whence it cometh or whither it goeth," for it is a short-lived little gourmand, and only appears at long intervals, but it is capable of doing a vast amount of harm during its brief and voracious career. The entomologists of the Agricultural colleges are telling the farmers about the ugly little pest and how best to destroy it, but the information, in many cases, even if valuable, will come too late. Professor Piper, of Pullman College, says it is not the same creature as the army worm that devastated Eastern states many years ago, but is the variegated cut-worm. The name, however, is not so important as the manner of its sure and sudden taking-off, before he gorges himself to death on all the vegetables and grain of the country. Professor Piper recommends Paris green, used dry on plants like cabbages or beans, and wet, by spraying, on all other crops. For the dry mixture, one part of Paris green should be mixed with 20 parts of powdered lime or flour, and sifted from a sieve-bottomed box. For spraying, one pound of Paris green is used, with a pailful or two of lime, and in 250 or 300 gallons of water. Some farmers say however, that even Paris green is not effective to check such myriads of the worms, appearing and overrunning a place so suddenly. There is only one consolation in the case; the nasty plague will soon disappear, and in all probability will not return for many years.

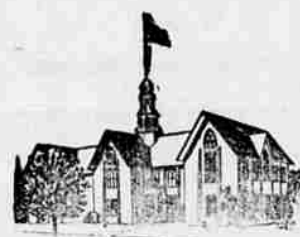
