CONSUL MILLER AGAIN.

In His Last Letter He Is on His
Way to China.

Through Hon A H Carson, who re-
ceived a personal letter from Mr Miller,
the Grants Pass News is able to publish
a portion of the same, so
those interested to hear direct will
learn what he has to say:

U S ARMY TRANSPORT LOGAN,
OFF EAST COAST OF ISLAND OF
FORMOSA, BOUND
FROM MANILA TO TAKU, CHINA,
VIA NAGASAKI, JAPAN,
JUNE 29, 1900.

MY DEAR MR CARSON:—Here I am
sailing about through the China seas
with a regiment of U S regulars going
to war in China. We will land at Ta-
ku, and I will get to see something of
the war, although I do not expect to
enlist.

I shall probably return to Nagasaki
on this boat in the course of a month,
and if the war continues I will no
doubt be back here, so that I may
be back by Oct. 1st.

We cannot get any information here
about this trouble, and probably know
less about it than you do.

We had a very nice trip from San
Francisco to Manila, being a month on
the way. We spent two weeks in and
about Manila and enjoyed it very
much, although the weather was very
warm, and one perspires constantly
day and night. The country is rich,
the people are poor and the climate is
hot (or much like it).

We went about as much as it is safe
to go, and found many interesting
things. The people are bright and
shrewd, cut throats and liars, and are
killing many more soldiers now than
during actual warfare.

I found very few people who care
to remain there. Geo Hart and
Charles Perkins both desire to remain.
Perkins is a clerk in the navy yard.
Hart was in the hospital, but not very
sick.

I rather hope to return by fall, and
in the meantime I am seeing much of
the Orient, and learning many inter-
esting things. Laura is quite well and
enjoying travel immensely.

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ANNUAL INSTITUTE

Lane County Teachers at Train-
ing School.

A PROFITABLE SESSION.

The Lane County Teachers' Annual
Institute opened this morning in the
circuit court room of the court house,
under auspices which augur well for its
success. The institute opened with an
attendance of about 60, which will be
considerably augmented this evening
and tomorrow. The institute will be
in session July 30, 31 and August 1, 2
and 3, and as a training school to
teachers will prove of incalculable val-
ue.

The instructors are: Professor C W
Durrette, of Mt Tabor schools, Port-
land, Professor D A Groat, principal
Park street school, Portland, and Pro-
fessor E E Orton, principal of Geary
school, Eugene. This is the third year
that Professor Durrette has acted as in-
structor of the Lane county institute,
and he grows more popular with each
visit. His work is thorough and sys-
tematic, and always has good results.

The other instructors are among the
best known educators in the state.
Superintendent W M Miller gives
close attention to institute work, which
probably accounts for the success of the
meetings under his supervision.
