UNITED STATES TERRITORIAL ACQUISITION.

The other day the Oregonian sought to justify the acquisition and annexation of the tropical Philippine Islands by the statement that the Democratic party had been a persistent territorial grabber. The Portland paper did not falsify history, though it drew conclusions favorable to the McKinley imperialistic policy not justified by facts. All the present continental territory of the United States, with the exception of the original thirteen colonies, and Alaska, was secured by Democratic administrations. Here is the history:

France ceded the Province of Louisiana in 1803. This vast territory now includes the states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Missouri, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and part of Colorado. Jefferson was the Democratic president through whose keen foresight this territory, now including about one-half the integral area of the United States, was secured. It is an empire of itself in point of area and varied resources.

James Monroe purchased Florida, including the southern coast strip of Alabama and Mississippi, in 1819.

In 1845 Mexico ceded Texas, and again in 1848 enriched the United States by the cession of New Mexico, Utah, Nevada and California. James K. Polk was the Democratic president who secured this rich territory against the opposition of the Whig party from which the Republican party drew its main strength, and whose successor it became in national policy.

Take the map of the United States and note how well these territorial acquisitions have rounded out our national possessions. But there is another picture on that map. Cast your eyes across the representation of the Pacific Ocean on the paper nearly nine thousand miles. There you will see the Philippine Islands, territory with tropical climate, unfitted for the residence of the white man, more densely populated than the state of Ohio, and with an alien blood—the Malay—unfitted by nature, tradition and education for citizenship in this government, the most enlightened the world has ever produced. Imperialism—the

McKinley idea—would hold those people as subjects. Mr. McKinley, for the Republican party, dares not admit that they may be made citizens. Will the laboring men of our country support a policy that may result in bringing them in competition with a horde of servile Asiatic laborers? The choice lies between Bryan and McKinley.

NEEDED HERE JUST NOW.

A delayed exchange with an account of the Kansas City national Democratic convention, July 4, has an account of how the hotels kept the delegates cool. The correspondent wrote:
 "They have a unique way of enabling people to get cooled off in their town in many of the hotels. In the floors there are huge iron gratings which look like registers. Underneath these registers are big fans, and from out the openings when the fans are working there comes almost a gale of wind. You stand over one a minute and you are cool. The wind is so forceful enough to blow your hat off and blow your coat over your head. The visitors call them 'Cyclone strainers.'"

"God help the people of India!" exclaimed a member of Lord Curzon's India council, who is reported in the Manchester Guardian, of April 21st, as he began to explain that \$75,000,000 is annually paid to European officials employed in India, who send all their savings home; and that the land is so heavily taxed in many provinces that the peasant can not save enough in good years for years of bad harvest. One-fourth to one-half the products of the land is required to pay land rent exactions in addition to onerous taxes on a variety of articles, the salt tax alone amounting to \$40,000,000 annually. Lord Curzon, viceroy, draws a salary of \$125,000 annually. He donated \$3,000 to the famine relief fund!

TO DAWSON AGAIN.

Will Take Shipment of Pack and Work Horses From Here.

Pendleton E. O. W. F. Matlock, who returned recently from Dawson City, is to go again to the Klondike town, taking a shipment of 20 or 25 horses. He ships them from Pendleton over the W. & C. R. and N. P. to Seattle, and thence by steamer to Skagway, and on down the Yukon to Dawson. He will be accompanied by John Thorp.

Mr. Matlock has bought horses weighing from 800 to 1600 pounds each, the lighter ones being designed for pack animals, and the heavier for work.

Mr. Rosenberg will also accompany Mr. Matlock, going to Skagway, to remain there as Mr. Matlock's agent, attending to his business during Mr. Matlock's absence. Mr. Rosenberg intends to remain in Skagway for a term of years if he likes the country. Mrs. Rosenberg will continue teaching school here, and will join her husband in Skagway next summer, probably to remain there during Mr. Rosenberg's sojourn in Alaska.
