ITALY IN SORROW.

King's Remains Lie in Monza—
Murderer Not Remorseful.

MONZA, July 31.—The body of King
Humbert, dressed in black, lies today
on the bed ordinarily used by him.
Around the massive candelabra hold-
ing burning tapers at the foot and head
of the bed are flowers, placed by Queen
Margherita, who passed the long hours
of night in prayer by the bed on which
the body lies. Father Bignami, the
court chaplain, is in immediate charge
of the bier. The Cardinal Archbishop
of Milan has ordered a requiem mass
in all the churches in his diocese.
Bressi maintains an air of the ut-
most cynicism. In the course of his
examination, he declared himself to be
a revolutionary anarchist, and said he
was ready to resume operations if he
were released.

Ridpath, the historian, died in the
Presbyterian Hospital at 5:30 o'clock
this evening from a complication of
diseases. He had been a patient in
the hospital since April 26. At the
time of the historian's death his wife

side. The body was later removed
from the hospital.

American, British and Japanese Troops
Made the Start This Forenoon

CHINESE HOLD 600 HOSTAGES

LONDON, August 1.—The Chinese government is tem-
porizing with the allied forces.
They hold 600 foreigners in Peking as hostages until
terms of peace can be settled.

ALLIED TROOPS MAKE A START.

its charter by repeated failures to comply with the provi-
sions thereof.

VICTORIA'S SON DEAD.

Duke of Saxe-Coburg Suddenly
Expired, and Thus Escaped
Lingering Suffering.

COBURG, July 31.—The Duke of
Saxe-Coburg, who died at 10 o'clock
last evening at Rosenau Castle, by his
sudden demise escaped a painful, tin-
gering end. Recently, at a consulta-
tion of specialists in Vienna, it was
discovered that there was a cancerous
growth at the root of his tongue. His
Royal Highness was unaware of the
real state of his health, and hoped he
would recover until Friday last, when
his condition became such as to pre-
clude hope. During the minority of
his heir, the Duke of Albany, the gov-
ernment of the Duchy will be con-
ducted by the Prince of Hohenzoln
Landenberg, the guardian of the young
Duke.

LONDON, July 31.—The news of the
death of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-
Gotha, second son of Queen Victoria,
has created a sensation in London, as
it was totally unexpected. The Queen
was deeply affected and the Prince of
Wales cancelled the arrangements for
attending Goodwood today, where his
horse, Lucknow, was the favorite in
the race for the Stewards cup.

TERRIBLE DEATH

David Kauble Wound Around
Shaft at Coburg Mill.

BODY WAS HORRIBLY MANGLED.

David Kauble, an employe of the
Booth-Kelly Lumber Company in
their planing mill at the Coburg mills,
met with a horrible death this morn-
ing. He was caught by a belt while
trying to throw it off a wheel, and
literally crushed to pieces. A moment
after swiveling around the shaft, A C
Wheeler, the foreman, saw him and
immediately signaled to W T Haw-
thorne to stop the engine. Together
with other employes they rushed to
where the unfortunate man was but
found life extinct.

According to the testimony of Dr W
Chechire, who went with Coroner G
W Griffin to the scene of the accident,
the injuries were terrible. All the
bones of the chest were broken, and
the sternum mashed in several places.
All the ribs were crushed in. The right
arm was torn off at the elbow and badly
mangled. The left arm was almost
severed at the shoulder, the bone above
the elbow broken in two places and the
forearm badly crushed and mangled.
The right thigh was broken in sev-
eral places, and the right leg broken in
several places and the foot crushed.
A small fracture of the left temple was
found and the neck was broken.

Aside from Dr Chechire the follow-
ing witnesses were examined, all being
employees of the company, and working
near Kauble when the accident occur-
ed: A C Wheeler, W T Hawthorne,
Carp Gray, Herbert Jones, Geo W
Catching. Their statement is to the
effect that Kauble must have gone be-
low to throw a belt to save stopping the
engine, and was caught on the belt. It
was done so quick that no one saw him
drawn around the shaft. Kauble had
been cautioned several times to not
throw a belt in this manner, and was
not required to do so by the company.
It was evidently a case of carelessness
on his part, made so by long use of ma-
chinery.

Mr Kauble had been working in the
mill at Coburg for about fifteen years,
for Mr Goodale, and for the Booth-
Kelly Company since they purchased the
property. He was a good workman
and considered careful and competent.
He was well liked among the employes
and associates and had no enemies.

David A Kauble was about 41 years
old, unmarried, and leaves a father,
mother and two sisters, Mrs Wesley
Beeson Mrs James Tillman. He was a
member of Coburg lodge, No 263,
Woodmen of the World, West Point
lodge, No 62, I O O F, and Diamond
Rebekah lodge No 89. In the Wood-
men he carried \$2,000 insurance.

It is a singular coincidence that Mr
Kauble was killed within 10 feet of the
place where a sister, Mrs Sam Skinner,
was killed about 15 years ago, when the
sawmill was owned by Hiram Smith.

When Coroner Griffin returned to
town this afternoon arrangements for
the funeral had not been completed.

Following is the report as handed in
by the coroner's jury:

We, the undersigned jury called to
investigate the death and cause of
death of David Kauble, find that the
body before us is the remains of the
said David Kauble and that he came to
his death by being caught and
crushed on a counter shaft, on the
lower floor of the planing mill belong-
ing to the Booth, Kelly Lumber Co,
at Coburg, Oregon, on the morning of
August 1, 1900. We hold no one re-
sponsible for the accident.
