PORTLAND TRUCKMEN STRIKE

Wholesale Business Houses Un-
able to Move Consignments.

Portland Telegram July 31.

Over 125 teamsters and truckmen
employed by the leading transfer com-
panies went on a strike today. They
demand an advance of 50 cents wages
per day. They have been getting \$2
per day.

For a couple of days traffic will be
at a standstill. Already today the
business portion of the wholesale dis-
trict has the appearance of Sunday.
All the large wholesale houses depend
upon the transfer companies for mov-
ing their freight, and until new men
are put to work there will be a verita-
ble blockade of freight at the different
warehouses, docks and train transfer
stations.

Jobbers cannot fill orders until the
strike is declared off.

Several of the firms by rustling about
succeeded in getting a few teams work-
ing, but not enough in any manner to
relieve the strain. At all the different
transfer points freight is piling up
rapidly and shippers will suffer con-
siderably unless the blockade is soon
broken.

Oregon Hop Outlook.

Corvallis Gazette.

The hop crop of Oregon this season
will be exceptionally small. Last
year's out-put was 80,000 bales and
this was far from average. Some esti-
mate this year's product at 60,000
bales, but Mr. John Whitaker, one of
the best posted men on these matters
in the state and a heavy Benton coun-
ty county grower, believes a conserva-
tive estimate would be 45,000 bales.
While the outlook for a good price is
not now encouraging, he believes the
shortage will be felt and fair prices
prevail.

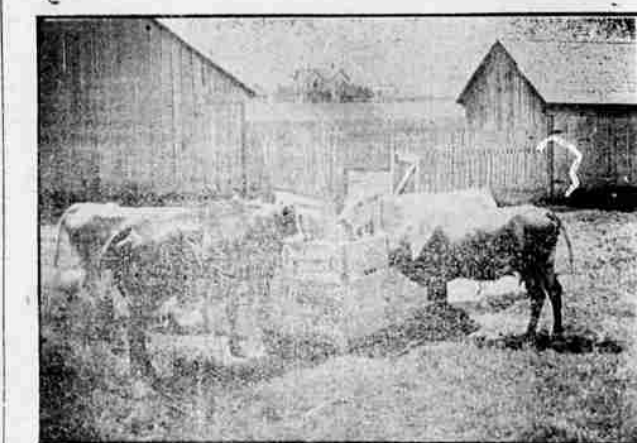
