ERRATIC WILLIAM.

Emperor William of Germany may be depended upon to keep himself in the public eye, not only of his own kingdom, but throughout the civilized world. His promulgation of the worn-out idea of the divine rights of kings subjected him to ridicule, while his deferred trip to the Holy Land, undertaken with protestations of piety, was viewed with suspicion as to the motives by which it was prompted. On sending his soldiers to China to wage bloody war William showed a remarkable change of character.

"If you close with the enemy," said the emperor, "remember this—spare nobody, take no prisoners. Use your weapons so that a thousand years hence no Chinaman will dare look askance at any German." And then the benediction of the Creator is pronounced upon the soldiers thus: "The blessings of God be with you. May the blessings of God rest upon your banners, and may He vouchsafe to you to find a path for Christianity in that far off country."

Bloody war and murder of surrendering combatants urged upon his soldiers, and all in the name of God! How can the level-headed German take such a ruler seriously?

TRADE AND THE FLAG.

New York World, July 25.
The official statement of the exports from the Philippines during the calendar year 1899, made public yesterday, gives the total at \$19,256,091.

Of this the hemp exports were valued at nearly \$8,000,000 and raw sugar at about the same—only one-tenth of which came to the United States. The remainder was made up from copra, leaf tobacco and cigars. The exports by countries including gold and silver, show: To China, \$8,910,498; the United States, \$4,040,255; England, \$3,701,863; Japan, \$1,983,896; and Spain \$1,170,231.

So that China, which has no "flag" in the Philippines, got nearly \$8,000,000 more of this small trade than we did, and England almost as much. We receive at this port on a single steamer day more imports from Europe than come to us in a whole year from our wonderful new possessions. The entire value of the commerce for a year does not equal the cost of the occupation and war for a week.

War in South Africa does not prevent the exercise of social amenities. General Roberts is trying to capture the Boer general Botha and his command yet, according to the telegraph, Mrs Botha took din-

ner with General Roberts the other evening. Probably she thinks Roberts a more successful if not handsomer man.

Great Britain is getting things red hot in all sorts of forms this year—a famine in India, war in South Africa, insurrection in China, troubles on the Afghan border. And it was only a few months ago that British representatives were prominent at The Hague as promoters of the peace congress.

In these days of rapid action, few men remain long in the public eye. Our two living ex-presidents, Cleveland and Harrison, are completely shelved. Dewey has had his brief day. No one cares for Kipling, and Lord Roberts has ceased to engage the world's attention.

Andrew Carnegie insists that these are prosperous times. They are for Andrew. The New York Journal is authority for the statement that Carnegie's individual income from his steel works is greater than the combined incomes of all the workmen in his employ.
