THE FIRST BATTLE

THE ALLIED FORCES LOSE 1200
OUT OF 16,000

ANTI-FOREIGNERS CONTROL PEKIN

WASHINGTON, August 6.—Cable reports to the war department received today confirm the rumor of an engagement Sunday morning between Chinese troops and the allied army.

The 16,000 allies had a sharp engagement with the Chinese six miles out of Tien Tsin. The allies lost 1,200 killed and wounded. The greatest mortality was among the Russian and Japanese troops.

The Chinese troops are reported to be retreating, and it is thought the allies will be able to make quite a distance without meeting with another determined resistance. There is a growing belief that it was not a wise move to start such a small force to Pekin.

CHUNG KING, August 6.—The situation is becoming more serious in the northern provinces of China. Everywhere it is more apparent that Pekin and its strong hold-out against the Powers is affecting other places, and they have a desire to ignore even all standard usages of war. Foreign consuls at nearly every point in the northern provinces are leaving their posts, and it is safety for them to do so.

ANTI-FOREIGNERS IN CONTROL.

LONDON, August 6.—Great anxiety is felt in official circles in this city for the continued safety of the ministers in Pekin, occasioned by a cable to the department of state to the effect that the anti-foreign powers again control Pekin.

The allied forces are making slow progress in the advance on Pekin, which is accounted for by a known difference of opinion among the generals of the various countries having troops in the advance.

LABOR MIGRATION PROHIBITED.

ANOTHER BERTH.

Dr. Chapman President of Indiana Normal School.

WAS ELECTED LAST WEEK.

The Indianapolis Press of July 31 donates space to the closing exercises of the Central Normal School of Danville, Indiana, and more especially to James A Joseph, president for the past 11 years, who is compelled to retire on account of ill health. It further gives space to the following announcement of the new president, which will be of more or less interest to Oregonians and friends of the University of Oregon:

"The close of this collegiate year will see the departure of President James A Joseph, who on account of the poor health of his family, has been compelled to dispose of the institution to Dr Chapman of Oregon, formerly president of the University of Washington. President Joseph has been at the head of the school for eleven years. His successor comes highly recommended, is a graduate of Johns Hopkins University and an educational writer of note."

The Press does not accurately describe the new president, yet close enough for identification. He is Dr Charles Hiram Chapman, and he was formerly president of the University of Oregon, greatly to its detriment. A brainy man, but unscrupulous to a degree and entirely lacking in executive ability, Dr Chapman nearly wrecked the leading educational institution of Oregon by jealousy, defect and mismanagement, and its fair name and usefulness was preserved only through his summary dismissal. Through the able management of President Strong, the University has literally taken a new lease of life and is now going rapidly ahead.

The school to which Dr Chapman goes as executive head has a student enrollment of 1500, and its influence is said to be beneficial and far reaching. It is to be hoped that experience will have proven a good teacher to Dr Chapman, and that his record in Oregon will not be duplicated in Indiana.

TO CAN PEARS.

Eugene Cannery Will Be Operated by the Allen Packing Co.

Saturday's Salem Journal: "C L Nieman went south last evening to Eugene, where he will go to work on the cannery there for the Allen Packing Co., of this city. The Eugene cannery will be operated by the Salem firm and a large number of pears have already been engaged."

"L E Abby will also go up, probably tomorrow, and the plant will be put in first class shape."

"The cannery here will handle the Bartlett pears from the Wallace orchard."

A Valuable Industry.

The partial failure in crops this year calls our attention to the necessity of diversified agriculture on the part of the active farmers of Lane county. We have called the attention of our readers several times to the great advantage and profit of the Angora goat culture, and we are pleased to say that the efforts of the GUARD in this direction have met with great success. We give below a case that shows in a practical way the great value of the Angora goat from a business point of view. The article is taken from the Oregonian, and is as follows:

Jacob Zigler, a pioneer farmer of Washington county, thinks goats are worth their weight in gold, for clearing land. He was in Portland yesterday, and told how he had kept a band of 100 for 20 years, and thus cleared a good-sized farm of underbrush while at the same time he made money off his goats.

"I simply turn a bunch of them into an enclosure," he said, and they do the rest. They strip the bark off the young firs and kill them, and they get fat on the hazel brush, "sarvice" berry, poison oak, fern and everything in the shape of undergrowth that they go up against. They kill the brush by peeling the bark off, and it soon rots away, leaving the soil bare and ready for a sowing of timothy or orchard grass."

"While the goats are costing nothing to keep, they increase grandly from year to year. They shear, on an average, five pounds, which nets me a dollar, and the wethers I can eat when they get fat. Butchers won't buy them because the meat won't do to fry. If people knew how good it was boiled, I could sell them readily. Under ordinary circumstances, Angora goats increase 100 per cent every year. Coyotes, however, must be kept off, and the little kids taken care of in bad weather."

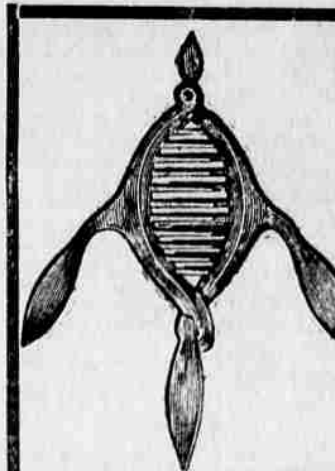
