GREAT BRYAN DAY.

INDIANAPOLIS, August 8.—The committee of one from
each state selected at the Democratic national convention
at Chicago, July 4, to officially notify Wm J Bryan and
Adlai Stevenson of their nomination performed that duty
today.

states crowded the city, and Bryan's presence created
the greatest demonstration ever witnessed in Indianapolis.

LATEST CHINA ADVICES.

WASHINGTON, August 8.—Chinese Minister Wu has an
edict of August 2, issued by the Chinese government re-
citing the fact that as order has not yet been restored in
Pekin, the foreign ministers would be consulted as to the
plan of escort out of Peking to Tien Tsin.

A message has been sent to United States Minister
Conger advising him of the approach of the relief column.

Minister Wu has a decree of August 5, made by the
Chinese emperor, permitting the powers to communicate
with their respective ministers.

Reports from England are that the Chinese have been
expelled from Tien Tsin and are retreating.

Admiral Remy reports that the Japanese troops captured
Pei Tsang before the American command arrived.
The fight was probably continued at Yand Tsin.

BLUE RIVER

J. E. Blazier Having a Stamp
Mill Hauled In.

THE ROAD QUESTION OF INTEREST.

J E Blazier, of Portland, was down
from his Blue River property today on
business and will return there tomor-
row. Mr Blazier has the machinery
for a two-stamp mill at Springfield,
and is having it hauled to the camp.
He will at once place it in position and
begin grinding ore.

In conversation with a GUARD re-
porter this morning Mr Blazier ex-
pressed great confidence in the future
of Blue River as a mining camp, and
is anxious to see enough mills started
on various properties to take the dis-
trict out of the experimental stage.
This will be done, Mr Blazier states,
by the first of the year. Aside from
the Lucky Boy mill, which is now
doing effective work satisfactory to its
owners, Dr Candiani, Ponnay Bros &
Davis, Wagner & Meuzens and Mr
Blazier will have mills in operation by
that time.

Regarding the prospect work being
done on various claims of the camp,
Mr Blazier says it is more than sat-
isfactory. Ore can be milled at Blue
River very cheaply, and if the assays
made at various stages of tunnel work
are any indication, the mills do
their work, he thinks there is no reason
why all these various properties should
not be put on a good dividend paying
basis. In other words, the camp
should at once be placed on the per-
manent list.

Mr Blazier returns to attend to the
setting up of the mill and will proba-
bly be in the camp for the next three
months. If his hopes are realized by
the operation of the mill Mr Blazier
will add more stamp and enlarge the
output of the mine.

Speaking of the road from this city
to the district, Mr Blazier says it is
being watched with much interest by
all in the district, and he was gratified
to learn that success was to be attained.
The amount of money now virtually
assured, wisely expended, will result
in a good permanent highway being
built.

CIRCUIT COURT

County Judge Contest Now Be-
fore the Court

OTHER CASES

Circuit court convened in adjourned
term this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Pres-
ent—Judge J W Hamilton of Rose-
burg, Sheriff W W Withers, Steno-
grapher Mrs Emma C Thompson and
Clerk E U Lee.

The following proceedings took
place:

44. Geo Fisher et al vs Eugene
Loan & Savings bank et al; to set
aside. Reply filed.

John M Williams vs L F Crow; to
recover money. Default. Judgment
for \$122 50, bearing interest at 10 per
cent; on second cause of action interest
at 8 per cent. Judgment for \$63. At-
torney fee of \$20 allowed on cause of
action.

O F Knox vs H R Kincaid; contest
for county judge. W C Hale appeared
for plaintiff and E R Skipworth, L
Blyen, J J Walton and Geo B Dorris
for defendant.

The following witnesses were called
by the plaintiff: W E Simmons, Ir-
ving; E P Coleman and Wm Vanduy,
of Coburg; J M Stafford, Mohawks; J P
Ramsey, Fairmount; J E Young, West
Cottage Grove; E U Lee, Roy Knox
& L Gibbs, Eugene. All but the last
three testified as to the ballots being
correctly sealed by the election judges;
and delivered to the county clerk or
his deputies. Clerk Lee and his
deputies testified as to the keeping of
the ballots.

F M Wilkins and L H Patterson
were called and testified as to the keep-
ing of the ballots. That they were
stored away in one of the vaults for a
week or more, the same being open in
the daytime; that a portion of the en-
velopes were opened and the ballots ex-
posed to view.

Clerk Lee was recalled by plaintiff
to say the ballots from the large pre-
cincts were hard to seal.

J M Williams called and testified
When I handled election packages the
clerk or board was present; the envel-
ope for Camp Creek precinct holding
the ballots was unsealed; I also han-
dled the returns from Glentena pre-
cinct; next morning after the count I
was present about one hour looking at
Lee handling the ballots, and doing
some legal work. Several days after-
wards Lee, myself and somebody else
searched for Camp Creek precinct tally
sheet and I found it; we also looked for
Glentena precinct tally sheet but did
not find it.

I noticed Richardson and Camp
Creek precinct envelopes holding bal-
lots unsealed; They looked as if they
had not been properly sealed and tore
away themselves. Mr Lee was present
at all times when I had anything to do
with the matter. When I first saw the
Camp Creek returns the letter was un-
sealed and the tally sheet was gone.
Roy Knox opened the box. Don't
know how the ballot became unsealed.
I wanted them to count Lost Valley
before going home as there had been a
dispute as to how that precinct had
gone on county judge.

Attorney E R Skipworth now object-
ed to the counting of the ballots, as
they had been improperly kept by the
clerk; therefore the tally sheet should
be counted. The clerk kept them like
a pile of old newspapers.

At the time of going to press the at-
torneys were arguing the above point.

Rev Elworthy Promoted.

Sunday's Oregonian contained a
picture of, and the following write-up
of Rev Elworthy, formerly of Lebanon:
Rev H D Elworthy, D D, who has
been appointed to take charge of the
Sunnyside Methodist church, from
which the former pastor, Dr Starr,
was suspended, arrived yesterday with
his family and has occupied the par-
sonage, on East Morrison and East
Thirty-fifth streets, Sunnyside. Dr
Elworthy was selected to meet the
peculiar conditions at the Sunnyside
church, the congregation having been
torn up by several church trials, one of
which resulted in the deposing of the
regular pastor, and the withdrawal of
a few members. He has had 20 years'
experience in the ministry, in connection
with the Oregon conference, and
is regarded as an able man and well
fitted for the task before him. He was
taken from Creswell to fill the place at
Sunnyside till the meeting of the
annual conference, the middle of Sep-
tember, when he will probably be sent
back to Sunnyside church for the year.

FOR SERVICE.—A Salem dispatch of
August 7th says: "Governor Geer re-
turned tonight from his trip to Mount
Hood. He said that in case war was
declared with China, or a call for
troops is made, he will immediately
tender the National Guard of this state
for service in China."

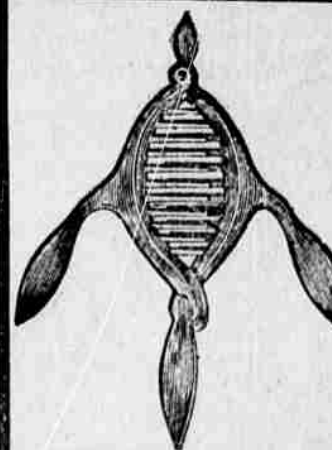
