### Florence Items.

Schooner Bella sailed for San Francisco yesterday with a cargo of lumber. C D Thomas came in Tuesday to greet his old friends and enjoy the cool ocean breezes for awhile. The Roberts arrived from Portland Tuesday evening with a cargo of merchandise and fishing gear. C B Morgan, Chas Cox and A F Hurd and wife start to Roseburg this afternoon to prove up on timber claims. W W Brown, Darwin Yoran and Mr Nicklin, of Eugene, were among the arrivals on the Mink yesterday. They are on a bicycle trip and propose to visit Gardiner, Marshfield, Bandon and other places on the coast before returning. There was a strange woman in Florence Tuesday whose actions aroused some curiosity. She came from the south and left by the beach toward Heeeta after eating dinner and paying for it at the Morris Hotel. She would not tell anything as to where she came from or where she was going, except that she said she was traveling up the beach and intended to build a fire and camp out. Milton Nicolle had his foot crushed while working in a logging camp at Mapleton last Friday. He was working on a steep side hill trying to start a log down when it started quickly and pushing him along caught his foot between that log and another and crushed it badly. He was brought to Florence and made as comfortable as possible while a messenger was sent to Gardiner after Dr Patterson. Upon examination the doctor found two bones dislocated and another fractured.

## TERRIBLE CHINESE MURDERS

### Ten Missionaries and Thousands of Native Converts Massacred.

#### RUSSIANS SHELLED AMERICANS BY MISTAKE.

LONDON, August 13.—A terrible mistake occurred at the battle of Yang Tsung, August 10. The American forces had routed the Chinese and occupied their position. The Russian allies were not notified of the change of position of the American troops and commenced to shell them. The Russians were quickly notified and the shelling instantly ceased.

#### JAPANESE SUFFER LOSS.

LONDON, August 13.—The Japanese troops suffered a loss of 300 killed and wounded at Pei Tsang August 6. The Chinese left 200 dead on the field when they retreated.

#### KILLED FOR THEIR RELIGION.

LONDON, August 13.—Ten out of fifty missionaries and 3000 Chinese converts have been murdered at the vicarage of Southwest Pe Chi Li.

#### FAVOR BRYAN OVER MCKINLEY.

INDIANAPOLIS, August 13.—The delegates to the anti-imperialist's conventions now being held in this city oppose both imperialism and free silver, but favor Bryan over McKinley.

#### TWO SAILORS DROWNED.

NEWPORT, Aug. 11.—The steamer Roberts, which arrived here last evening, reports the drowning of two men on Siuslaw bar yesterday morning. Captain Hansen, of the schooner Lizzie Prinn, which recently arrived at that place to load lumber for San Francisco, had taken on his cargo and was ready for sea, but apparently not satisfied with the depth of water reported on the bar by the tug Roberts, went out to take soundings himself in a small boat, with two of his sailors. While on the bar a breaker capsized their boat and the two sailors were drowned. Captain Hansen succeeded in clinging to the upturned boat and drifted ashore. The names of the lost men were not known.

#### Bryan's Populist Notification.

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 12.—Kansas populists and democrats are combining to make Bryan's populist notification at Topeka on August 23 one of the biggest political events that has ever taken place in Kansas. Besides the Hon T M Patterson, who will make the notification speech, it is stated that Webster Davis and J B Weaver will address the crowds. John W Breidenthal, populist-democratic nominee for governor, predicts that 40,000 Kansans will come to the meeting.

ANOTHER GUN ACCIDENT.—Saturday evening at 9 o'clock, at Springfield, a 13 year old son of Charles Hayes of that place was shot in the left leg between the knee and hip, in a peculiar manner. At the time of the accident, young Hayes, in company with several boy companions, was standing on the mill race bridge when a stray bullet fired from a small calibre gun struck him as stated above. Dr Van Valzah of Springfield and Dr L W Brown of this city attended the injured lad but were unable to locate the bullet.

KEPT POSITION.—Among the mules bought for government service and shipped Saturday were two trim black ones as near alike as two peas. They had evidently worked as mates for on what part of Bangs' general they stood all day Saturday, it was side by side, keeping the same relative position, as even as though harnessed to a wagon. The mule is a great stickler for precedent.

### A HOBO THIEF. Was Caught Stealing Shoes in a Freight Car.

This morning at 7 o'clock as the freight train stopped at the Eugene yards to leave some goods consigned to local parties, the crew opened a car which held the goods, and found a young hobo actively at work helping himself. The boy had opened several through cases of shoes and had them scattered over the floor of the car looking for sizes that he could wear or use. He had also wrapped up several pairs ready to take with him when leaving the train.

The train crew telephoned down town for an officer to turn the boy over to, but could not wait until he arrived, so took the thief on to Junction, expecting to hand him over to an officer at that place. The hobo had entered the car at some point south of here.
