At any rate Captain Williams had his socksless men fall in with fixed bayonets, when they discovered that the noise had been made by Co A boys under command of Captain Huston. The Company A boys were then invited in, (they were already in, but that didn't matter) and each side told "how it was," and how they felt about it.

After a half hour's visit Captain Huston and his men mounted their bicycles and returned to the city, leaving the men in camp to peaceful slumber.

Daniel B. Test Dead.

The following notice appeared in the Sunday Oregonian, August 12: TEST—At 622 East 19th street, on Saturday, August 11, 1900, Daniel Blair Test, aged 83 years and three months. Funeral from Evangelical church, East 19th and Tibbets streets, at 10 a m Monday. Services at the grave private.

"Dan" Test, as he was familiarly known in Eugene, came to Lane county with the immigration of 1853. He married here and took a homestead on the prairie between Irving and Junction. The family moved to Eugene about ten years ago, and resided in the present Galney Mathews residence on Ninth street, until about six years ago when they moved to East Portland.

His wife and seven grown sons and daughters survive him: Mrs Marshall, of Eastern Oregon, Mrs Mary Workman, of Portland, Mrs M S Barker, of Eugene, and Ed Test, Mrs Emma Hill, Grant Test and Frank Test, of Portland.

FRED D. HERBOLD.

Coaching University of Idaho for Game with Washingtons.

Spokane Review, July 30. The University of Washington and the University of Idaho will battle on the gridiron at Spokane the coming football season. October 20 has been set as the date of the game and the Washington and Idaho teams will then have the first intercollegiate contest ever held in Spokane.

HERBOLD IS COACH. Fred D Herbold has been selected as coach of the University of Idaho football team, which is to meet the Blair eleven during the fruit fair in this city. He is considered the man to humble the Washington boys and to take away the football pennant from all of the western institutions.

Carroll L Smith, the manager of the Idaho, has spent much time in Spokane looking over the field for a suitable man to direct the destinies of his team. He now announces that the old college tackle and half back, Fred Herbold, will be the man the Spokane athletes will have to blame for the stiff games of the Idaho players. Herbold is a well-known hero of the gridiron and is considered one of the strongest players in the West. He has had experience on many teams and has always held his own against the opposing man.

Herbold began his career as a player of distinction in 1893 on the University of Oregon team, where he played for four years. For the next two years he was the rushing back of Purdue, Indiana, University eleven, and was one of their strongest players. He is a great line buckler and goes through the opposing interference like a pile-driver. He will teach the Idaho players the same style of work, and heavy plays with occasional open runs will undoubtedly be the game with which they will meet the opposing team.

Herbold has received splendid coaching. In 1893 he was under the tutelage of Young, of Princeton, then under Church, of the same institution. In 1895 he was taught other points of the game by Quarter-back Benson, of California, and in 1896 by Frick, of California. In 1898 he played under Woodruff, of the University of Pennsylvania, and last year he coached the well known Butte team of Montana.

MAY PLAY EUGENE.

Manager Smith announces that the University team will begin training earlier in the season than usual. He confidently expects to take the championship of both Washington and Idaho, and of all the schools of Oregon. Herbold has played in the latter state and will coach his team against their style of play. The university has a heavier line than it has had for several years' and with the backs well protected can do much. The team will make a tour of both Washington and Oregon this season and expects to play two games in Spokane.
