City Council.

Council met in regular monthly
session last evening, present Mayor
Harris, Councilmen, Osburn, Honey,
Luckey and Preston. Report of pro-
ceedings of the previous meeting was
read and approved.

Councilman Osburn read the usual
number of bills reported favorably by
the finance committee.

Street commissioner Turner reported
the use of 23,547 feet of new and 11,265
feet of old lumber in the repairing of
street crossings.

Council Osburn of the special com-
mittee on rock crusher reported the
letting of a contract of 3000 yards of
crushed rock for 80 cents per yard to be
placed on the streets and spread.

An ordinance to amend the ordi-
nance relative to construction of divi-
sion walls within the fire limits, in a
manner other than brick, was passed,
upon motion of Councilman Osburn.
The amendment relative to permis-
sion of construction of wooden buildings
within the fire limits was defeated
after considerable discussion.

On motion of Councilman Osburn
an ordinance regulating the driving of
cattle in the streets and alleys of
Eugene was adopted.

It provides that no person shall
drive through the streets of Eugene
more than 10 head of cattle to or from
pasture. The owner of any cow shall
be liable for all damages to the person
damaged by any cow trespassing. Fine
\$2 to \$5.

On motion of Councilman Roney
the use of a telephone in the office of
Chief of Police was ordered discon-
tinued after September 1st.

The matter of granting further com-
pensation to Contractor Lorette for
extra work on grading of Jefferson
street, on motion of Councilman
Osburn was referred to the street com-
mittee and who were empowered to act.

On motion of Councilman Osburn
the recorder was instructed to purchase
the winter wood for the city, the price
not to exceed \$3 per cord.

The matter of erecting hitching
racks along Park street, on motion of
Councilman Roney was referred to the
street committee.

Street committee authorized to put
in Poll drain.

"HE HAILS FROM OREGON."

And Got the Oregonian to Publish
a Three-Quarter Column Laud-
atory Mailed "Dispatch"
About Himself.

Colonel(?) J A Straight (he was a
private in the war) is responsible for
placing the Oregonian in a very ridicu-
lous, but amusing position through
publishing a three-quarter column
"mailed" dispatch about the doughty
colonel(?) from Washington. We
have space for only a few of the choice
extracts:

"Since the organization of head-
quarters here, one of the most earnest
workers in connection with the office
has been Colonel J A Straight, of Eu-
gene, Or, who is now connected with
the literary department of the national
committee. Having been active in
politics throughout that section, he is
in close touch with the situation there,
and has proven a valuable assistant to
Chairman Hanna in his work for the
West."

"In 1858 Colonel Straight moved to
Iowa, where he edited the first republi-
can paper established in the far West,
published at Council Bluffs. At the
same time he became identified with
the growth of the republican party in
that state, and was one of its managers
during and after the Civil War, paying
particular attention to the literary
work of the party."

"After leaving Iowa, Colonel
Straight moved about among the
Western states, getting in touch with
the political situation in each, and has
never allowed his interest to lag. To-
day he has been assigned to looking
after the campaign work in the West-
ern states with which he is most con-
versant, the states west of the Missouri,
and in his opinion all of those states
will cast their electoral vote for Mc-
Kinley. In the opinion of Colonel
Straight there will be some great sur-
prises in store for politicians this fall.
Probably the greatest will be to see
Colorado go republican."

"The same conditions that have
wrought a change of sentiment in Col-
orado in favor of republicanism have
been at work in other Western silver
states, and Idaho, Montana, Utah and
Wyoming, as well as Oregon and
Washington, are again republi-
can, with the sentiment in favor of
McKinley and Roosevelt growing like
prairie fire."

THE "COLONEL'S" OPINION OF HIM-
SELF.

"With his keen perception of con-
ditions in the West, and being in
thorough touch with the party in all
those states, Colonel Straight is pro-
viding a very essential factor in republi-
can headquarters. His services have
been and will be invaluable, and are
such as to demand belittling recog-
nition when the next administration is
formed. He has earned, and will
probably receive some good office at
the hands of the government, where
he can continue to serve the party and
country throughout the next admini-
stration."

If Colonel(?) Straight succeeds in
booming the party as well as he has
himself his services will prove invalu-
able to Chairman Mark Hanna, and
will undoubtedly get him "some good
office, etc." "Colonel" Straight is a
"good one," and no mistake.
