COLLIS P. HUNTINGTON.

The brain that built the western part of the first transcontinental railroad lies cold in death—no better than the clods of the field. Collis P. Huntington was a wonderful man. He moulded legislatures and congresses as he would, and was not particular as to the means employed.

His colleagues, Stanford and the Crocker, were ordinary business men. Huntington supplied the genius. And it was a great genius that could map out the vast possibilities of transcontinental railroad connection, and induce congress to donate the builders almost enough to build the road, besides a princely grant of land.

A VICE-PRESIDENTIAL EXHIBIT.

The newspapers that report large crowds flocking to hear Governor Roosevelt are not accurate. Crowds do not go to hear Teddy; they go to see him. Their interest in him is not literary or phonetic, but zoological. He is an exhibit. But at the same time Roosevelt can talk plenty. The other day he said of his political opponents:

"They stand for lawlessness and disorder, for dishonesty and dishonor, for license and disaster at home, and cowardly shrinking from duty abroad."

Perhaps he prepared that speech before Mrs. Dewey withdrew the admiral as a candidate, and when Roosevelt expected to have Dewey for an opponent; but it is good, strong argument. True enough, it is not quite so convincing as his assertion four years ago that Bryan and his anarchistic followers ought to be stood up against a wall and shot; but we must remember it is yet early in the campaign.

Russia is the natural guardian of Asia, as is the United States of America. Her European territory abuts Asia almost the entire longitude, and Siberia, her Asiatic pos-

session, comprise the entire northern part of Asia, about one-third of the entire area. If Russia resorts to protective tariffs so does the United States. It is hard therefore to find any logical or moral ground for an alliance between the United States and England to interrupt the progress of Russia in her natural sphere of influence.

Mohamet Ali, a native of India, was killed near Brooks, in Marion county, Sunday, by being struck by a train. The Asiatic was very impartial in that he carried credentials from two boards of charities that were exactly diverse as to the status of the holder. The Seattle board recommended Mohamet as a good man, while the Portland board certified that he was no good.

Prominent gold democrats who led the fight in 1893 say fully 85 per cent and probably 90 per cent of the gold democrats in Minnesota, who voted for either McKinley or Palmer four years ago, will vote for Bryan this year, and the remaining 10 or 15 per cent may yet fall in line for the Kansas City ticket and platform.
