The second blast of the big rock in the mouth of Yaquina harbor was made Sunday forenoon at 9 o'clock and was witnessed by a large number of people. It went three hundred feet high. A photographer got a snap shot of it. It is said over four feet have been taken from the top of the rock.

Repair work on the jetty at Fort Stevens, at the mouth of the Columbia river, under the direction of Superintendent Hegardt, is progressing at a rapid rate, says the Astoria Budget. FIFTEEN-YEAR OLD TERROR.

JUNCTION CITY, Or., August 14.—Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. T. Harris, of Eugene, was in the city today at the examination of Arthur Williams, a boy of about fifteen years of age, who was arrested here this morning on the charge of breaking into a way car. He was discovered by the trainmen when the train stopped at Eugene. Two boxes of shoes, which were in the car, had been broken into. The trainmen locked him in the car, but he cut a hole in the side of the car, reached through and broke the seal on the door and got out here. He was caught and locked up. At the trial he waived examination and was bound over in the sum of \$300 to the October term of court.

He was taken to Eugene and placed in the county jail by Sheriff Withers.

BLUE RIVER MINES BONDED.

D. E. Taylor and H. Kling, of Seattle, Bond Three Groups of Claims.

The Blue River mining district continues to attract attention from outside points. More prospectors have filed into the camp, and more moneyed mining men have looked the field over for prospective paying properties this season than ever before in the history of the district. The end is not yet. In fact the beginning is hardly apparent.

Good ledges, which assay well, and which show every indication of permanence are being uncovered every day. By the first of the new year no less than six mills will be in operation in a district which had not even one mill less than a year ago. Is not that indication of satisfactory ore valuations?

Among those who have recently bonded properties in this district may be noted D. E. Taylor and Henry Kling, of Seattle, Washington, men who can leave the fascination of excited travel through their home city to much-boomed Alaska alone to come to a district where nature and climate are favorable to mining operation the entire year.

These gentlemen have taken a bond on the Exchange, Lexington and Bronco groups of claims, owned by S. C. Sparks and sons. These groups consist of two claims each and the prospect work on them warrant more development. Messrs Taylor and Kling arrived in Eugene today from a visit to the bonded claims, and leave for Seattle to attend to some business matters. They will return in about one month and will at once put a force of men to work on development. The gentlemen are experienced mine operators and will expend considerable money in the driving of tunnels.

In conversation with these gentlemen a GUARD reporter learns that much satisfaction is expressed at the enterprise manifested by road building, made possible through the business foresight of Eugene and county business men and citizens. Over \$5000 spent on the road at this time will bring a return 10 fold, and is of itself the best advertisement the camp ever had, as it shows a belief in its permanence.

Accident to a Farmer.

JUNCTION CITY, Aug. 14.—John Quinn, a farmer living three miles south of town, met with a bad accident in which two of his fingers were caught in a binder, laying the bone bare and lacerating them terribly. Dr. Oglesby, who attended him, thinks he can save them.

FOR OLYMPIA.—Judge H. R. Kincaid left on this afternoon's train for Olympia, Wash., to spend a few days on business. He said to a reporter: "I am compelled to go to Olympia at this time to look after some business matters for my sister. She has a residence at that place. The taxes on the same are about three times as much as the rent I am now the city threatens to build a \$50 sidewalk around it.
