HOPGROWERS' PICNIC.

Valuable Information Imparted by
Growers of Experience.

Woodburn Independent, August 16.

The hopgrowers' picnic held in Sims
grove, Butteville, last Saturday, was
very largely attended, and much inter-
est manifested in the fun and educa-
tional proceedings. People were there
from many sections of the state. The
hop was discussed in all its points. It
was decided that poles were the cheap-
est; trellises produced more even color,
and while twining cost most, it gave
the finest quality.

That it was best to cultivate deep,
twice each way, then shallow, quit
early. Manuring increases the lice.

That picking pickers by weight is
the correct method.

That picked hops should not be un-
necessarily exposed; pick clean, pay
for hops in box or sack; put on kiln
floor as soon as there is enough to cover
the proper depth, 18 or 20 inches, lay
loose and even, dry with 135 to 140
degrees; use sulphur, but no other
chemicals; let them thoroughly cool,
then remove to store room. After
flooring is laid, start fire in stoves,
having previously swept stoves and
pipes, start sulphur in pans on plat-
form inside of kilns, keep proper heat,
burn about 1 pound sulphur per box
of hops if green color, if ripe use less
sulphur; hops must not be stirred;
they will usually dry through, and be
ready to come off in 15 or 16 hours—
must not remain after being dry—
experience necessary.

That dealers want ripe, clean picked
hops, free from mold or insect pests,
unbroken, of a bright color.

That 35 cents per box be paid to
pickers.

AN ABLE ADDRESS.

President Strong Talks to the
Indian Institute.

President Frank Strong, of the Uni-
versity of Oregon, delivered an address
to the Pacific Coast Indian Institute at
Salem Tuesday on "The Present As-
pect of Education." President Strong
said in part:

"The interest in education is greater
than ever before. It is so because it is
becoming more and more evident that
education in its broadest and truest
sense is the most important matter
with which we have to deal. This is
true for at least two reasons. First,
education has to do with the preserva-
tion of all that the past has given us
of culture, of mind evolution, of all
those many factors that go to make up
general human efficiency; second, educa-
tion increases and extends human
culture and human efficiency. Educa-
tion, therefore, has to do not only with
the mere school training of children,
but it determines the quality of civili-
zation that we possess, the production
of wealth of which we are capable, and
the total product of our National
activity in every direction.

"This gathering tonight is one of the
evidences of the strong hold of educa-
tion upon the thought and feelings of
the people. It is becoming more nearly
universal than ever before, and the
idea is becoming more prevalent that
a generation owes it to all coming gen-
erations to transmit the accumulated
treasures of the past, with all the in-
creased efficiency that self-denial can
make possible. In this way a part of
that mysterious power, altruism,
works under the general law of evolu-
tion to benefit the race. It is for this
reason in part that he who stands in
the way of higher education stands in
the way of the progress of the race.

"The doctrine of evolution has per-
meated every department of thought
almost like a universal law. It has
profoundly affected education, and edu-
cation will become a science in a true
sense than before when the bearing
of evolution on education is clearly
seen and admitted. When education
as a whole becomes properly adjusted
to the nature of the child and to the
accumulated experiences of the race, it
will have become indeed scientific. Too
often in the past it has both ignored
the nature and progress of development
of the child, and the meaning of the
teachings of history. It set the indi-
vidual off as a unit, unconnected with
the accumulated experience of the
race. Evolution has set a new value
both upon the individual and the race.
Man is bound to the race by uncount-
ed ties which no force can break. The
crowded millions of earth's past have
not lived in vain. Upon the accumu-
lated profit of their experiences we are
to erect the civilization of the 20th
century. It is the idea of evolution,
that the child is irrevocably bound to
the race, that is revolutionizing our
ideas of education, that is forcing the
world to add to the efficiency of the
race. For if men or nations fail in
their duty, it but rolls a heavier load
upon those that walk with bleeding
feet this wilderness of earth.

"This pressure which evolution
brings upon the race to add to the
accumulation of the past is in this day,
when society is so complex, and the
accumulated experience of the race is
so vast, forcing education into the
hands of the state. The work to be
accomplished is so great, and the cost
is so enormous, that only the strongest
organization of modern times can
undertake the burden."

PREDICT AN EARLY FALL.—Og-
tiners predict an early fall. They say
that the swallows have all gone, that
already the leaves are turning near and
yellow, and that there is the misty
smell of fall in the air. These old-
timers of times gauge climatic changes
more surely than those who employ
the most scientific methods. It seems
to be a sort of instinct with them, like
the old fellows who can foretell a
storm by feeling the rheumatism in
their bones.

SCHOOL STATISTICS.—Superintendent
of Public Instruction J. H. Ackers-
man, in his report of the financial
standing of the several counties of
Oregon as regards the school fund
for the year ending 1899 credits Lane
county with receipts of \$55,942.07;
disbursements, \$54,318.92. For 1900,
receipts, \$60,217.53; disbursements
\$56,002.05.
