MEN MAKE THE STATE.

The Chinese consul-general to San Francisco made an address before an Oakland local society, yesterday, in which he questioned the policy and advisability, from a purely selfish standpoint, of the powers forcing Christianity on China. He said his countrymen are increasing rapidly, and with the destructive engines of warfare that modern civilization are furnishing might triumph against the world.

The consul-general overlooked one very important fact. His countrymen lack the virility, the stamina to stand before the Anglo-Saxon in an appeal to arms. And the very improvement of weapons has immeasurably strengthened the virile blood of Europe and America. Brute force and numbers will not withstand Anglo-Saxon courage and intelligence.

MADAME WU ON MARRIAGE.

Madame Wu, wife of the Chinese minister to Washington, could not escape the interviewer who was anxious to get her ideas on the important subject of marriage, and giving in marriage.

"There are no flirtations in China," observes Madame Wu. "China never frivols." She explains that one never falls in love and marries in her country, but marries first and falls in love afterward. We are further given to understand that love always follows marriage in China as a matter of course. When Chinese parents choose husbands for their daughters "it always is right," because "Fate makes one certain man for each woman." So much depends on the standpoint of prepossession that it is not surprising to find Madame Wu plainly intimating her belief that they manage these things better in China than in the United States.

Strange and unacceptable as these ideas of wooing and wedding are to American minds, the fact remains that they are shared by the vast majority of the human race. The 200,000,000 people of Hindostan hold them as tenaciously as the 400,000,000 people of China. The native people of Asia, whether Mohammedan, Brahmin or Buddhist, adhere to them unanimously. Nor is Europe, if we except the British Isles, in complete conflict with

these Oriental ideas of marriage. Parents choose husbands for their daughters in all other European countries to a very great extent.

COMING DRESS REFORMS.

As a vindication of the rights of a sex, the shirt-sleeve movement among men should receive the encouragement of our applause. Reform must come, and it should come all the easier since woman has shown us the way. And after the shirt-sleeve the knickerbocker.
