CALAPOOIA WAGON ROAD.

Work to be Started at Once to Reach Gold Hill.

Brownsville last Tuesday held a meeting to build a wagon road from that place into the Blue River mines.

The Brownsville Times of August 17th says:

"No sooner had the meeting adjourned than the committee commenced work, and the result has so far been highly satisfactory. Mr. Elswick and Mr. John Arthurs, who was selected to assist Mr. Elswick in getting the tools and commissary in shape, are about ready for work, while Mr. Coshaw reports excellent progress with the subscription paper. It is expected that about 15 or 20 men and a team will be at work on the new road Monday, and more men and teams will be added as fast as they can be secured. It is the intention to push the road through as far as possible this fall, and if not finished this year to complete it early in the spring. Last month the county had the road surveyed and viewed and ordered opened, and now in order to open it money must be used, and there is no doubt but that the people of Lane county will be as liberal, if not more so, than the people of Lane, who have just raised the sum of \$5241.50 for improving the road up the McKenzie river to this district.

"Substantial assistance has also been assured by the heaviest claim holders in the district, who will unite with Lane county in building the road."

THRESHING RECORD.—Armitage & Stevens have completed threshing 2,500 acres of grain for customers and themselves in the forks of the Willamette and McKenzie. Usually it takes them 24 to 25 days to make the run, but this year 18 days sufficed to do the work on account of the shortness of the crop. The average of wheat was 9 to 10 bushels, oats 15 bushels. The average of the entire amount was just about one-half a crop.

THEIR MELANCHOLY LOT.

They Catch Every Disease—Pigs for Professors to Practice on.

Corvallis Times, August 15.

"One of the shipments received Monday was 25 guinea pigs. They came from Jacksonville, Illinois, and are for use at the Agricultural College. They go into the bacteriological department, where they will die for the benefit of humanity. Their texture and organization is much like that of the human family, and that is why they will have to die. Every old disease of goats, chickens or other domesticated animals or fowls that comes along, and about which information is wanted, will be given to one or more of the newly arrived pigs.

"From an affected part of the dead or diseased creature the germs of the malarial will be, if possible, taken. A culture will be made in which the germs will grow, and then the live germs will be put in the fifteen guinea pig. If the thing works out all right he will get the disease, and then it will be known that the correct germ has been secured. The problem then, is to find a cure, in the progress of which half a dozen guinea pigs are liable to forfeit life, health and earthly happiness. The process is naturally rough on the guinea pig, for if he lives long enough he is sure sooner or later to be a sufferer from all the going diseases from itch to tuberculosis.

"The true importance of the guinea pig in the world is not indicated by his appearance. He is about as big as a good sized rat. He is shaped like a pig with fashionable about and the customary fold in his tail. He would be white if his person were not adorned with small spots of about the same color as the buttoned pants that the Southern soldiers wore in the Civil war. In some instances the spots are black.

"The newly arrived lot came from a farm in Illinois, where their production is made a specialty. They were shipped in a double crate with a dozen in each compartment. Their cost was \$5 per dozen at the farm or \$10 for the lot. The freight was \$10, making an average cost laid down of 83 cents each."
