A PERVERTER OF FACTS.

There was no war in the Philippines when Dewey came. There had been an insurrection—not for independence but for reforms. Spain overcame the rebellion, partly by fighting, partly by promising reforms, and partly by bribing Aguinaldo and other leading "patriots," with heavy sums of money, to leave the islands.—Oregonian.

The Oregonian is an insistent perverter of facts. "When Dewey came" Spain had no foothold on the Philippine Islands, except that held in Manila and a few other fortified coast points, and those held by force of arms. The islands, practically, were as free from Spanish authority and control as were the thirteen colonies from British domination when the patriot colonials and their French allies cooped the British troops in New York and compelled peace and recognition of the truth enunciated at Philadelphia, eight years before, that "these colonies are, and of right ought to be free and independent states."

Our \$20,000,000 title to the Philippines from Spain is little, if any, better than any that could have been conveyed by Great Britain when New York was evacuated. Spain had nothing to sell, could not give possession or valid title. She had been practically whipped out of the islands.

No one need be surprised if the Oregonian should claim that there is no war in the Philippines now—that the 55,000 American soldiers over there are merely doing police duty and taking sun-baths. There "was war in the Philippines when Dewey came" for any Spaniard who dared place his foot on territory outside of fortified places or those commanded by guns of Spanish warships! There is war in the Philippines now for the American who puts himself outside of the protection of the army or fleet, notwithstanding the president's declaration that the islands are "pacified."

THE MAINE ELECTION.

Maine is one of the few states, Oregon included, that holds her election for state and county officers on an earlier date than the presidential election. The Maine election will take place September 10, and the nearness of date to the presidential election usually causes the Republican national committee

to take a conspicuous part therein. While Maine is safely and surely Republican any falling off from the usually large majority would be accepted as an indication that Republican voters were dissatisfied with the administration, and that the vote of the rest of the country would be depended upon to follow the lead of Maine.

From now till September 10 the voters of this small and safely calculated Republican state will be assailed not only by a multitude of local Republican spellbinders but also by forty orators from all parts of the country, selected from the Republican national committee and booked to deliver no less than 700 speeches. On the other hand the Democratic campaign, as naturally would be expected where there is no hope of success, is of the perfunctory order. The Maine "straw" must be pointed.
