MANY LOOKS.—Salem Statesman,
August 9: The C K Spaulding Log-
ging Co. are making their annual
drive of logs for the Pulp and Paper
mills of Oregon City. The logs began
to arrive here yesterday, and it will
probably be several days before they
are all by Salem. There are from six
to eight million feet in this drive of
balm and cottonwood timber, taken
from the banks of the Santiam, Lucki-
amute, McKenzie and Willamette.
These logs are cut in the spring when
the bark will peel off readily, and are
drawn to the river bank to await the
time for the drive to begin, which is
usually in July. The timber is manu-
factured into pulp and paper at the
large mills in Oregon City. There are
about twenty-five men engaged in
driving the logs, and it will be several
weeks before they arrive at their des-
tination, at Oregon City.

THRASHING ACCIDENT.—While John
Robbins, aged 24, was assisting in
thrashing at Joseph Gates' farm on
Spencer Creek, Sunday, he was caught
by the tumbling rod. Before the horse-
power could be stopped he was com-
pletely stripped off clothing. A duck-
ing coat was torn off his person, and no
buttons were left on his clothing. His
body was bruised until there is hardly
a spot that is not black and blue.
Strange to say the flesh was not torn
nor any bone broken. It is not thought
that Mr Robbins suffered any internal
injury.

PROSPECT IS GOOD.

Hops in Better Condition Than in
Many Years.

Salem Statesman.
The hop situation is improving from
day to day, and Oregon growers are
feeling much encouraged over the
prospect. From every part of the
valley come reports to the effect that
the hop yards are looking better than
ever in the past, and that the outlook
for a splendid crop of the finest qual-
ity, was never better, and the price of
hops also promises to be so much
better than in former years, as to
warrant the belief that the growers
will this year make back some of their
losses sustained in past years.
Hon M L Jones, of Brooks, president
of the Oregon Hop Growers' Associa-
tion, in discussing conditions yester-
day, said to a representative of the
Statesman:
"The situation of the Oregon hop
growers is daily improving. The in-
dications for a good crop of choice
quality are first class.
"The bankers seem to be willing to
loan picking money to reputable
growers who put up good hops. Jas.
Winst-nley, agent of the O H G A, has
orders to purchase hops of the 1900
crop at 11c and furnish picking money,
subject to his inspection as to quality.
While he does not advise present sales
or contracts, as there is every reason
to believe that prices will be better,
those who desire to contract may get
11 cents instead of 9 or 10 cents.
"New York growers are holding for
15 to 20 cents, and have made some
sales of early varieties at 18 cents. It
is earnestly recommended that growers
do not pick their hops until fully ma-
tured."

In the office of the county recorder,
yesterday, two hop contracts were filed
for record.

Sam Kin, a Chinaman, transferred to
the Bank of Woodburn, all his hops
growing on the 70 acre yard of Mrs
Sarah Hovenden, near Butteville.

O E Barber, of Woodburn, sold to
Valentine Lzwil, of New York, 8,000
pounds, at 10 cents a pound, 41 cents
to be paid at picking time, the re-
mainder when the hops are delivered
to the railroad station in October.

H J Ottenheimer for Lillenthal Bros
is willing to renew his former propo-
sition of 15 cents guarantee to the O-
regon hop growers, without reference to
California and Washington hops.
