THE COMPANY WON'T PAY.

The Widow Sues for \$5,000—Captain Geary's Life Insurance.

Corvallis Times.

A big suit has been begun in the Benton county circuit court. It is for the recovery of \$5,000 and the plaintiff is Mrs Maud Geary. The defendant is the Provident Life Insurance Society, of New York. The latter is a life insurance concern in which the late Captain Woodbridge Geary's life was insured for \$5,000. The occasion for the suit is the point blank refusal of the insurance people to pay the policy. The premiums were all kept paid up, and proper proof of death was furnished, but in spite of it all, the company persists in withholding from the bereaved widow that for which the premiums were patiently and promptly paid. It is hoped that the courts of justice may, in this instance, be in fact what they are in name.

The papers were filed several days ago, and the case should be tried at the November term. The plaintiff recites that plaintiff and Woodbridge Geary were married in Texas, August 5, 1888; that January 8, 1896 Captain Geary took with the defendant insurance company a policy of \$5,000 on his life, the amount to be paid within 60 days after proof of his death; that July 4, 1898, the insurance policy was destroyed by fire that burned the family residence in Corvallis, Oregon; that Woodbridge Geary was killed in the Philippines, October 11, 1899; that proof of death was immediately furnished to and accepted by the insurance company; that payment of the amount of the policy was and still is refused.

The point on which the company withholds payment is the following clause in the printed policy to which Captain Geary subscribed at the time of making the application: "That I will not personally engage in military or naval service in time of war without first obtaining in each and every case the written consent of the society." But Mrs Geary alleges that the company waived this condition in the policy and released Woodbridge Geary from performance thereof in this: that at the time of taking out the policy the agent of the company was informed that the applicant was engaged in active service in the U S army and that written permission was at that time given him at all times to engage in warfare; and that said permit was destroyed by fire.

In her complaint Mrs Geary further alleges that when her husband went to Cuba she notified the company, and that she again notified the company when her husband was sent to the Philippines. She further alleges that while her husband was thus engaged in active service that she paid and that the company accepted all premiums as they became due. One of these premiums was paid July 8, 1898; another January 8, 1899, and still another July 8, 1899, Captain Geary being all this time, with the company's full knowledge, in active military operations.

Apples for China Trade.

Consul Harry B Miller writes H B Douch, of the state board of horticulture, that Oregon apples should find a market in Shanghai, his place of refuge during the enforced absence from his consulate. He writes in part: "Yakima apples come in here every year and sell for \$7 silver per box, or \$3.50 gold. A good market could be had here for the Oregon apples if they could be sold for \$2 gold per box. I see no reason why the line of steamers out of Portland could not take up the matter and make business. Several varieties of Oregon apples should do well here.

"There are a great many wealthy Chinese living here, and they eat apples—like them, and I am convinced that a good apple market can be made if reasonable freight rates can be secured. All apples shipped here should be carefully selected, perfectly sound, well wrapped and nicely boxed."
