Closed Down.

Cottage Grove Nugget.

Having finished all the work laid out for this season on the Knott property, the party, consisting of Mr and Mrs T J Finnean, Mr and Mrs Douglas Ladd and Mr and Mrs W C Meagher, arrived here Sunday. The party will leave here some time this week for Portland, where they will visit friends and relatives for a time and then return to California for the winter, with the view of making the necessary arrangements for the shipping of a five-stamp mill to be placed on the property at the earliest moment in the spring. The work this season consists of a 55-foot shaft sunk on the ledge, and in which they made the great strike at the depth of 29 feet and 3 inches. At the closing down the shaft was 55 feet deep and the last assay taken at this depth, taken from the scrapings after "mucking" out for the last time, gave a return of \$785.20. Next year Mrs Finnean will put in the 5-stamp mill and make other necessary external improvements, as well as cross the ledge and drive a tunnel.
