SOME WASHINGTON DIPLOMACY.

On July 3 the Associated Press gave out the program to be followed by President McKinley in dealing with the situation in China.

"To act concurrently with the other powers in aiding to prevent a spread of the disorders to the other provinces of the empire and a recurrence of such disasters."

Apart from rescuing our diplomatic representatives in China the United States had no business to entangle itself in foreign complications. However, since the date when President McKinley kindly intimated his intentions to the Associated Press Germany has seized Kiaou Chou, England gave notice that no one must interfere with her in the Yangtze Valley, while Russia has appropriated Manchuria.

President McKinley must know that he has been made a caspaw to draw territorial chestnuts out of the Chinese fire to the edification of European diplomats. While acting "concurrently" with the other powers to prevent a spread of the disorders to other provinces those "other powers" have deliberately appropriated those "other provinces."

Washington diplomacy does not shine in comparison with that of the effete European monarchies.

THE COST OF EMPIRE.

The Philadelphia Medical World. Agent the Christian Herald's appeal for funds in aid of the India famine sufferers, the Philadelphia North American says:

Two rifle cartridges a day will support one life.

One six pounder shell will save a life for two months.

One twelve pounder shell will save a life until the harvest.

One pair of cavalry boots will save a man, wife and child until the next crop is gathered.

One minute's discharge of a Maxim gun will save a whole family from death.

The cost of the war for one second will save tea lives for four months.

Two rifles will save them and afford them the comfort of blankets during the rainy and cold season.

The cost of firing one shot from a six inch gun would save five families.

One scrub baggage train horse would save a small community.

One-fifth of the cost of attempting to conquer the Boers would save the entire fifty millions of England's starving subjects in India.

The rescue of these lives is simply a matter of money. There is food enough in India. All that is necessary is the means of buying it. "The cable operates quickly," says the Christian Herald, "and your contribution today may save scores, hundreds, yes, thousands of lives tomorrow." The cable would operate just as quickly at the command of the benevolent Americans. If it be true that every one of us who contributes two dollars saves the life of some wretched Hindoo who dies but for that dollar, then every human being in India who perishes for lack of such assistance is murdered by the government that is abundantly able to supply it, but prefers to devote the price of ten Hindoo lives per second to the extinction of republicanism in South Africa. That is "the price that staggers humanity."

Instead of saving its starving subjects in India, the British Empire prefers to kill people in South Africa. Does "empire" involve no responsibility, or is it simply a license to kill?

THE MCKINLEY "DRUMMER."

A late San Francisco Examiner has a very suggestive cartoon. Our

readers will remember that the commercial travelers, "drummers," were almost a unit for McKinley in 1896, and that they contributed in no small extent to the success of the Republican ticket.

McKinley was elected president. The capitalists organizations that contributed the money that Mark Hanna so effectively used in that campaign felt secure in a four year's lease of life for their schemes, and trusts sprang up on every side. The manufacturers pooled their interests, stifled competition, and there was no more use for the "drummer." They had the market by the throat, and the buyer had no choice. It was the same to him of whomsoever he bought. Those drummers who shouted so vociferously from Maine to Oregon for McKinley lost their jobs.

The Examiner cartoon shows the figure of a powerfully built man, representing the trusts, holding a skull labeled "The Commercial Traveler" in his hand. Mark Hanna stands by his side, a little behind. "The Trusts" representation is made to say: "Mark, do you remember how the poor cuss worked for us in '96? I wonder if we should cut off a check of your coat tail and send it around to his widow?"

ONE CENT DAMAGES.

The San Francisco Call was the defendant in a \$225,000 libel suit recently. The jury gave the aggrieved party one cent. In the earlier days of Oregon politics "Bill" Watkins, of Salem, was a Democratic war-horse. For a time he published a newspaper at the capitol, and his political enemies were not slighted as to personal attentions. One of Watkins's victims sued him for \$10,000 libel damages. The jury gave him one dollar.

A celebrated local lawsuit over the possession of a monkey was settled at the same term of the circuit court, the jury awarding the plaintiff one cent as full compensation for the monkey. This gave Watkins the opportunity to cut his enemy to the quick with the statement that the character for which damages were claimed was worth but "ninety-nine cents more than a monkey."
