HOPS.

It Is Said One Man Was Offered 14 Cents Per Pound.

Salem Statesman, Aug. 29

A leading dealer said yesterday that orders for hops were being daily received from Eastern and English dealers, the demand being very active, and as a result he expected the price at which the crop would move, to be a remunerative one, the quality of the hops, the smallness of old stocks and the eager inquiries for the new crop confirming him in that belief.

James Finney, of Brooks, one of the leading hop growers of the valley, was in Salem yesterday. Mr Finney has 35 acres of excellent hops, and he has received in the past two weeks offers of contracts for 12 cents per pound from each of three of the leading hop dealers in Salem. Upon his refusal, two of the dealers intimated that, if Mr Finney were disposed to contract at all, they would raise the bid, but fortunately he is not compelled to contract his hops, being amply able to harvest the crop without this manner of disposing of it. Mr Finney looks for a better price than 12 cents, and is satisfied he will secure it by the time the hops are ready to move.

It is reported that Al Jerman, on Howell Prairie, has been offered 14 cents a pound for his hops, on contract, and that Mr Jerman refused the offer, as he is confident of securing a better price, his hops being of excellent quality.

News About Stamps.

An innovation in the postal service which is sure to be of great convenience is the plan lately adopted of furnishing stamps in little books, with wax sheets between them. The government is to charge one cent additional to the amount of stamps contained therein, and it is now estimated that the profit on these books will amount to \$300,000 per annum. He is paying 1 cent a pound for Petites and 1 cent for Italians. The fruit will average well in quality and yield. E B McElroy, of Eugene, who has a large farm near Monroe, will furnish the drier with about 600 bushels of Petites and 500 bushels of Italians. Professor McElroy says the orchards of the surrounding country are looking fine, and that the crop of peaches and prunes is large.
