IN THE NAME OF RELIGION.

THE DECLINE OF THE "BIKE."

Whatever the reason may be, bicycles and their riders are not nearly so numerous this year as in the past. This is especially noticeable at the popular summer resorts. Asbury Park's famous bicycle boulevard, for example, which in previous years has swarmed with wheelmen and wheelwomen, can be crossed by the pedestrian at any hour of the day or evening without haste or caution. It is almost deserted. On a big place it might be that a cabin would be set up in a clearing on a hillside or down in some glade where a settler would naturally build his cabin.

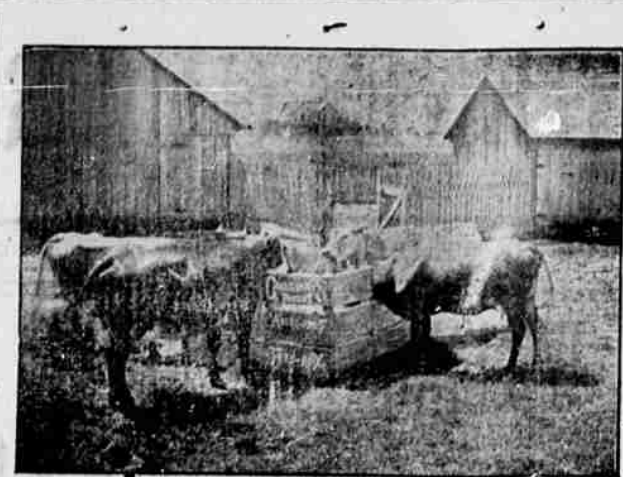
