FIND GRAVES IN SEA.

Galveston Being Cleaned as Rapidly as Possible.

Galveston dispatch Sep. 12.

Yesterday morning it became apparent that it would be impossible to bury the dead in long trenches, and arrangements were made to take them to sea. Barges and tugs were quickly made ready for the purpose, but it was difficult to get men to work.

No effort was made after 9 o'clock yesterday morning, to place the bodies in morgues for identification, for it was imperative that the dead should be gotten to sea as soon as possible. Many of the bodies taken out are unidentified. They are placed on the barges as quickly as possible and lists are made while the barges are being towed to sea.

CITY UNDER MARTIAL LAW.
Mayor Jones has given very full scope to Chief of Police Ketchum, and Mr. J. H. Hawley, chairman of the committee on public safety, to swear in citizens of good character as officers, and has told them that able-bodied men must be made to work or get off the island. The city, he said, was under martial law.

Picket lines have been established around the large stores, and guards placed on duty. The soldiers and police are instructed to shoot any one caught looting or attempting to loot. The jails are full, and summary measures are necessary.

RAINS IN INDIA.

No Further Anxiety for the Crops of This Fall.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Lord Curzon, viceroy of India, has cabled the India office, that good rains have fallen in Madras and Central Bengal and on the Gangetic Plain, relieving all present anxiety regarding the autumn crops in these territories.

The total number now receiving famine relief has fallen 4,334,000.

Despoils the Chinamen.

PEKIN, Wednesday, Sept. 5.—The Russo-Chinese bank, which was announced yesterday, closed here today, and removed to Shanghai, will confiscate as part of the indemnity to be paid to Russia, the Imperial University fund of 5,000,000 taels deposited with it, against which the Chinese drew for the payment of their troops.

[A tael is a Chinese coin valued at about \$1.40.—ED.]

Dr. Sheldon took his A. M. degree at Stanford University, and his Ph. D. degree at Clark University, Worcester, Mass. He is a progressive young educator, and comes well recommended.

Some Salmon Notes.

State Fish Commissioner Reed states that during the season recently closed the Upper Clackamas hatchery took 2,700,000 eggs, and the Salmon River hatchery took 1,200,000. While the egg supply this year is quite low, it is considerably greater than last year's supply.

A man on the Rogue River near Gold Hill, has availed himself of the opportunity of spearing large numbers of fish, without infringing on the law. He has constructed a sort of a dam out of brush, which extends from both sides of the stream, but a small opening is left in the middle for the fish to pass through. He has built a platform at this opening and can spear any amount of fish, which seek to pass. Nothing can be done to prevent this, as his dam does not reach all of the way across, and he uses neither traps nor seines.

To Buy Grand Ronde Fruits.

LaGrande Chronicle: T. N. Segar, of Eugene, arrived in the city Sunday. Mr. Segar is among the most prominent and extensive handlers of both green and dried fruits in the Willamette valley, and having heard such glowing accounts of the amount and quality of fruit raised in the Grand Ronde valley, has come to see for himself with the intention of investing, should he be able to find a sufficient quantity to justify him to establish a shipping point at this station. He is out through the valley on a tour of inspection, and should it prove satisfactory, will at once open a place of business here for the purpose of buying both green and dried fruits.
