A LOST OPPORTUNITY.

The starter of the Gulf of Mexico hurricane that devastated Galveston and the eastern coast of Texas Saturday afternoon, September 8th, was noted by the Weather Bureau on the 6th. At that time the hurricane was central on the coast of Florida where a thirty-six mile an hour breeze was blowing.

Chief Weather Observer Moore lost his opportunity for making a reputation. He was "skeptical" about the wind increasing in violence, and said the wind was "just holding its own." It reached at least a hundred mile clip at Galveston.

PHILIPPINE DOCTOR BILL.

It costs the United States government the enormous sum of \$720,000 a year to keep surgeons and other medical officers in the Philippines. This does not include nurses, hospital attendants and medicines.

The official records show that there are four hundred medical officers in the Philippines at an average salary of \$1,800. A recent war department bulletin states that the sickness amounted to 8 per cent. This for an army of 60,000 would be 4,800 men on the sick list, an average of 12 patients for each medical officer.

Walter Winans, the famous pistol shot, recently had this to say on how to shoot successfully and well: "As to the possibilities of the revolver—well, according to my ideas, at twelve yards the pistol is perfect, if the man can shoot. At twelve yards you ought to be able to put all the bullets in one hole. I have done it twice in one afternoon. At fifty yards I can put them all into a four-inch bull's-eye, and at 100 can put most of them in. The limit of the revolver is 400. I made forty-one out of a possible forty-two, firing six shots in twelve seconds, at a two-inch bull's eye at twenty yards range.

The overflowing of Galveston by the sea recalls to mind the greatest catastrophe of modern times. On

November 1, 1755, three severe earthquake shocks, almost as if one, almost leveled the seaport city of Lisbon, Portugal, to the ground. Almost immediately a great tidal wave forty feet high came in from the ocean and overwhelmed the city, completing the work of destruction. In the small space of six minutes 35,000 people perished.

Portland Daily Telegram, Rep: "When Senator Hanna says that 'the result in Maine has no bearing on the national election,' he confesses that it was a disappointment to the Republican managers, and he utters a silly falsehood with the next breath when he adds that it 'was in no sense a disappointment to the Republicans.'"

The Telegram reports that there were more bathers in the river at Portland Tuesday than any previous day of the summer. Up here, nearer the headwaters, the water has got too cold for pleasant bathing.

An observer on the Portland water front reports twenty-two scow dwellings on one acre of river below the steel bridge. An acre is about 212 feet square. The free rent water dwellers have sandwiched in quite closely.
