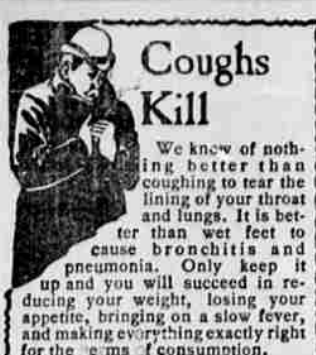

SEALS.

Mr. Max Berg, of Warren Columbia
county tells the St. Helena Star about
the profits of dairy business: His herd
consists of but 12 cows but that number
earns him \$50 per month throughout
the year. This sum is Mr. Berg's profit.
Each cow returns a profit of \$3 per
month over and above the cost of
maintenance. The skimmed milk
from the 12 cows produces \$3 worth of
pork each month, besides 12 veals each
year at \$5 each. Mr. Berg figures that
the butter the family uses is worth \$4
per month, hence his herd earns him
at least \$50 per month.

BLUE RIVER MINES

Another Ten Stamp Mill Con-
tracted For.

TIMES RUSHING.

BLUE RIVER, Or., Sept. 12.—Another
important deal in Lane county min-
ing property has just been made. S. C.
and Dexter Sparks have contracted
with Kling & Taylor, Seattle mining
men, for a 10-stamp mill. The con-
tract calls for the mill in consideration
of a certain interest in the Sparks' two
claims in the Calapooia district. The
mill will not be erected until next
spring. Messrs Sparks have also
bonded two groups of claims to the
same firm, the contract price being
\$5000 for each group. One of the
bonded properties is on south side of
the McKenzie river, about two miles
from Blue River postoffice and the
other on the north side of the stream,
a short distance below J. W. Wycoff's
ranch. Extensive development work
will be carried on this fall, the low
altitude of the claims making all-winter
work practicable.

HOP CROP.

Is Fully 250,000 Bales Less Than
Usual Yield.

Portland Telegram.

United States crop..... 25,000 bales
England's crop..... 150,000 bales
Germany's crop..... 25,000 bales

Total 250,000 bales
That is the estimated shortage of the
world's hop crop. The estimates are
based upon reliable returns, which will
be used in fixing the market price.
The London market has opened at 70
and 120 shillings per cwt, equal to 15
and 19 cents per pound. This would
make the price here 12 1/2 cents per pound
on board.

Billy and Nannie Goat

George A. Houck, the well-known
farmer and stock-raiser of Eugene and
Monroe, has written a very interesting
article to the Pacific Homestead and
the following extract, on the subject of
goats, and the dividends an invest-
ment in them will yield, will be very
instructive to many who are engaged
in this branch of industry or who may
have expectations of making any such
move. He says:

"I run my goats in two general
classes—those on farms and those kept
on my own land. As to the relative
profit of these classes, it would be a
difficult matter to compare, as the ones
kept on my own land are clearing
brush for me in addition to the annual
dividends cut from their backs and the
sale of the increase. The ones on
shares, however, have never paid less
than 30 per cent per annum on the
investment, and in one case I made 65
per cent per annum on the actual cash
investment for a term of three years
on a bunch of 60 head. I usually keep
them for terms of three years, getting
half of the mohair each year, getting
the old stock and half the increase at
end of term. I sometimes let them
for a year at a time, however, and as I
have just divided on one band I can
give my exact income for the last year
—or rather, ten months. These were
average nanies:

Income for mohair, 186 pounds
at 30 cents..... \$ 55 80
Income from increase after the
old stock was made good, 47
head at \$3..... 141 00
Total income..... \$196 80

My share being..... \$ 98 40
In other words, the 50 goats are
worth as much as \$1,640 at 6 per cent.
These figures for the kids are what
they could have been and for seven
divided. I did not sell—I bought.
