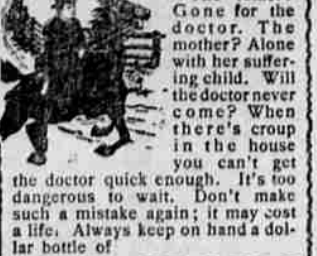

ACTIVITY IN BOHEMIA.

Superintendent Bruneau, of Helena Mine, Reports That Prospectors Are Still Busy.

PORTLAND, Sept. 20.—Charles B Bruneau, superintendent of the Helena mine, in the Bohemia district, who is in the city on business, reports considerable activity in the Bohemia country. Prospectors, he says, are still active, and considerable development work is in progress. The recent strike made about a mile west of the Musick mine, he reports fully as rich as was represented, some of the ore running into the thousands per ton.

At the Helena mine there are now about 24 men employed. This includes the force of carpenters and mechanics engaged in erecting bunkhouses, mess-houses and other buildings. Most of the machinery for the increase of mill capacity is already on the ground, and it is expected to have 10 stamps in operation by October 1. The present capacity of the plant is five stamps.

All told, Mr Bruneau says about 600 feet of tunnel work has been done on the Helena. There are four tunnels, and the greatest depth thus far attained is about 300 feet. Development work at present is confined to tunnels Nos 1 and 2. From four to five feet of good milling ore is being taken out along the hanging wall. This ore averages from \$15 to \$20 in gold to the ton, most of it being free milling, the base being of a high grade concentrating ore.

At the Helena No 2, where two tunnels are being driven under contract, Mr Bruneau says the ore now being taken out averages fully \$30 a ton.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Fall Session Begins Monday, September 24.

EQUAL TO THE BEST IN OREGON.

Next week will witness the beginning of another school year in our public schools. Every indication points to a larger opening attendance than any previous year. All the teachers are in the city and ready for earnest work. All four of the new additions to the corps have had considerable experience elsewhere, and will no doubt prove worthy of the appointment.

The course of study in the eight grades will conform exactly to the course established by the state department. The addition of the fourth year to the high school course places Eugene on an equality with any other city in Oregon in the educational advantages it offers its boys and girls.

The arrangement between the board of education and the regents of the University by which any student having completed the eleventh grade in the high school is entitled to admission to the University academy, will result in the loss of six or eight twelfth-grade students. This will cut down the number of the first graduating class to ten or a dozen, but what they will lose in numbers will be made up by the prestige of being the first class to graduate. It is the intention of the board of education to make these first graduating exercises the most important event in the history of the Eugene schools. These graduates will not only be entitled to admission without examination to the freshman class of the University of Oregon, but to any other university on the coast. The up-to-date high school of today gives its students a more complete and more liberal education than the average college of 25 years ago.

The Eugene high school is still in the formative stage and local conditions have governed to a certain extent the direction of its growth, but it has been the policy to make all its construction offered so thorough that it will receive full credit anywhere.

Additional facilities are being provided for the accommodation of the increased number of students at the high school, and various repairs are being made at the Central and Geary buildings, so that everything will be "ship-shape" for the boys and girls who will be on hand bright and early Monday morning.

FOUND DEAD.

An Aged German Citizen Succumbs to Heart Failure.

John Erdmann, an aged man residing with his son, Julius Erdmann, at Long Tom, in the western part of the county, died from heart failure yesterday. The circumstances are given out by Ross Huston, who came in today after undertaking supplies, are as follows:

The old gentleman went out yesterday morning to burn some logs and was last seen alive by his daughter-in-law about 10 o'clock. At noon Mr Erdmann had not returned to the house and his son went to look for him, finding him dead and lying close to the burning logs.

From a survey of the situation it was evident that the old gentleman had expired from heart failure while sitting on a block and the body had fallen to the ground. Death must have been sudden as the body fell on soft ground and there was no evidence of a struggle, notwithstanding the fact that the head was virtually in the fire when found, and the right side of the face, ear and hair were badly burned.

As the cause of death was clearly manifest Coroner Griffin did not consider his official investigation necessary. The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. Julius and Albert Erdmann, both sons of the deceased, reside in this county, and he had been residing with the former.

Deceased was born in Germany 72 years ago, and has been feeble for some time with occasional attacks of heart trouble.

Died.

B C Dunn died at his residence on Thirteenth and Willamette streets Thursday, Sept. 20, 1900 at 5:50 p m, after a lingering illness.

Deceased was born in Ohio, February 22, 1828, and was aged 72 years, 6 months and 25 days.

His early life was spent in Illinois. He was one of the argonauts of '49, going to California by way of the isthmus. After spending some years in California he returned to Kansas. He was married to Miss Elizabeth Gill in 1855. In 1876 he came to Oregon, locating on a farm 3 miles south of Eugene and had since been a continuous Lane county resident. He leaves a wife and six children. The children are Wilbur H Dunn, Kansas City, Mo; Arthur G Dunn, Washington, D C; Mrs E K Wheeler, Palouse, Wash; Frank B Dunn, Harry Dunn, Mrs L C Skeels, Eugene.

Mr Dunn was an upright citizen and was respected by all his neighbors.

The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the M E church, Rev J A Cleland officiating, and interment will be made in the I O O F cemetery.
