Died.

St Joseph White died of Bright's
disease at the residence of Mrs Brown-
lee, corner Eleventh and Olive streets,
Eugene, Oregon, Sunday night, Sep-
tember 30, 1900, at 10 o'clock, aged 36
years, 2 months and 14 days. He
leaves a wife, the daughter of Mr
Carey Thompson, who he married
July 29, 1900, and a father in the
State of Missouri, besides a number of
other relatives.

Mr White came to the Coast about
10 years ago, and to the Blue River
mining district about five years ago,
where he purchased the Sunset claim,
which he still owned at the time of
his death. This is thought to be the
richest mining claim in Western Ore-
gon.

Mr White was sick only a few weeks
being attacked by the fatal disease
only since his marriage. He was a
member of Spencer Butte Lodge, No 9,
I O O F, of this city.

The funeral will occur tomorrow
afternoon at 2 o'clock from the resi-
dence of Mrs Brownlee on the corner
of 11th and Olive streets, under the
auspices of Spencer Butte Lodge, No 9,
I O O F, of this city. Rev J A Cle-
land will conduct the religious ser-
vices.

Hops.

The Produce Price Current, of New
York, of September 15, after saying
the New York state yield turned out
about the same as last year, says:

"Growers do not seem in a hurry to
market their hops, and the few sales
reported of late have been mainly at
about 15 cents. Cable advices from
London give us no reason to change
previous estimates of the crop, which
is likely to be 35 to 40 per cent short of
last year. Our local market has been
in a sort of waiting condition, opera-
tors waiting to see the outcome of the
English crop. A moderate quan-
tity of stock is going to brewers to
meet current requirements, and there
is some export business from here and
on direct consignments from the west.
Supplies in first hands are lighter
than usual for this season of the year,
and this makes a firm holding of most
grades. The business that transpires
is within the range of our quotations."

BROWNSVILLE ROAD.

Work Has Suspended on the
Hill Tops.

Brownsville Times.

Work for the present has been sus-
pended on the Brownsville and Blue
River wagon road, the men and out-
fits coming out Monday. The road is
now finished to the DeArmond and
Barrett ranches. These gentlemen say
they will continue the work through
their places and have it completed by
spring, which will put the road at least
two miles nearer the mines when the
work is commenced in the early spring.
The citizens' committee who have
charge of the work, owing to the fact
that the county is not in shape finan-
cially to assist this fall, have thought
best to suspend further operations
until spring when the work will be
resumed and the road completed to the
mines. The committee have most
favorable assurances of assistance from
the Eastern corporations who own the
large timber tracts through which the
road passes; also from the county and
from the mine owners in the Blue
River district, who are clamoring for
this outlet to the valley, and without a
doubt whatever the road will be com-
pleted in the coming spring.

Though the membership is small, the
above officers are anxious to continue
the good work and if the public will
remain in sympathy with them, they
are very hopeful of good results. The
treasury is about empty and a bene-
fit will be given at Armory Hall this
week, and it is to be hoped that the
public will respond generously.
