DR. FLORENCE HUNT

One of the Noted Women of Chicago.

The Chicago Sunday Times-Herald of Sept. 30, 1900, has illustrations of a number of women headed: "Chicago women who have won their way in public life." In the center of the group is Dr. Florence Hunt, a niece of John Cogswell, of this city.

"It also contains this explanatory notice:

"Dr. Florence Hunt is a member of the city board of health, and also of the state medical board. From 1885 to 1889 she was a member of the medical staff of the county poor farm at Danville, Ill., serving part of the time as assistant medical superintendent. In 1897 the state board of health sent her to Russia as its official representative at the international medical congress which was held in Moscow at that time. Upon this occasion she was the only woman to sit upon the platform prepared for the most famous physicians and surgeons from all over the world. Dr. Hunt is one of the oldest and best known members of the Chicago Woman's Club."

STATE UNIVERSITY.

Annual Report of the Institution
Filed With Gov. Geer.

SALEM, Oct. 5.—President R. S. Bean, of the board of regents of the University of Oregon, today filed in the office of Governor Geer the annual report of the institution for the year 1899-1900.

"I am gratified at the outset to be able to report that the year just closed has been one of the most prosperous and satisfactory in the history of the University. The unfortunate dissensions which so much impaired its usefulness a few years ago have been entirely removed, and the president and faculty, as now constituted, are working harmoniously and zealously for the education and advancement of the young men and women under their charge. Doctor Strong, who was called to the presidency about a year ago, has taken hold of the work with an enthusiasm and intelligent grasp of affairs which promise well for the future and the effect of which is already apparent. In the reorganization of the University, he has laid broad foundations for future development and progress, so that, no matter whether the growth be fast or slow, no matter what courses or departments may have to be added or subtracted, the general plan of reorganization will not have to be altered for many years. The discontinuance of the lower preparatory grades has made the Associated Students a body of earnest young men and women. With an able president, a learned faculty, and such a class of students, the University is beginning to fulfill the purpose of its organization."

STATEMENT OF UNIVERSITY LAND FUND.

The wants of the University are set forth as follows:

"The largely increased attendance at the present time—October, 1900—being about 50 per cent over that of last year, and the consequent demands upon the teaching force and for greatly increased library and laboratory facilities, make the present income of the University very inadequate. If its standing and usefulness are to be maintained, and it is to keep pace with the general educational progress of the state, additional legislative aid in its support is imperative. A central heating, light and water station is very much needed, both as a matter of convenience and economy: At present, the six buildings on the University campus are each heated separately; some by ordinary heating stoves, others by hot air furnaces, and others again by steam or hot water. As a result danger from fire is very much increased, the expense for fuel and service largely in excess of what it would be if the buildings were all heated from one central station, and much space is used for the storage of fuel which could be advantageously utilized for other purposes. In addition, the present light and water plant and the machinery in the mechanical and physical departments, could be moved to the same building and all operated together without any substantial additional expense for fuel, or otherwise."

BURIED AT JUNCTION.—Hatcher Baber, late member of the Second Oregon, U. S. V., who died at Prineville, was buried at Junction yesterday. It was intended at first to inter the remains in the association lot in this city, but by the request of his family the burial occurred at his old home. A guard of honor from the military companies here went down to attend the funeral.

BEAR KILLED.—Moses Blodgett and Elmer Yarnell, at Mohawk, killed a black bear after an exciting chase. They fired 27 shots at him, eight passing through Brain's body before they brought him down. He weighed 435 pounds. A quarter of the bear was sold on the streets this forenoon at a good price.

MR. DURST WRITES.

He Corrects an Error—Thinks in Thirty Days American Hops Will Sell Well.

The following is self-explanatory: EUGENE, Oct. 6, 1900.

EDITOR DAILY GUARD, Dear Sir:—You have certainly "done me up brown" this time, and I thank you sincerely for your good intentions.

I am not the largest hop grower on the coast. What I said, I think, was that my people, the Dursts of Wheatland, or my father, W. P. Durst, is the largest bona fide grower on the coast. Our crop is at year, every bale of which was sold in London, was 3,964 bales. I do not like to sell under false colors, but some of my friends when they see your paper will have the laugh on me. We can lay it to a typographical error.

I feel sure that if the growers can get on without selling for a few weeks they will all realize good prices. The situation in England is very strong. There is no trade yet for the reason that English brewers do not buy American hops until the boards are clear of the English crop.

The demand may open in London in 30 days, and as soon as it does our market will feel the effects of it.
