OUR TREATMENT OF CUBA AND PORTO RICO.

Excerpts from speech of John F. Fitzgerald of Illinois before Yale University Democratic Club October 10.

"General Miles did not promise these people alms; he did not promise them charity—they did not ask charity. He said to them they should be citizens of the United States and have all the blessings that the American flag conferred on the American people. We have deprived them of even such local government as they enjoyed under Spain, and we are covering that island with American carpet-baggers, who are devouring their substance and eating their taxes. Even the money which we give back to them in the shape of alms is not handled by the Porto Ricans, but is handled by American carpet-baggers, who distribute it where they think it is most needed, and will do the most good; and owing to a slight defect of vision the carpet-bagger always feels that money is the most needed and will do the most good near home. It staggers one's credulity to read the list of American carpet-baggers filling thousands of official positions, created since we took possession. They cover that island and the island of Cuba like the frogs once covered Egypt.

"Last winter our people were indignant when they read in the great journals that our military officials of these islands were drawing double salaries, all wrung from those poor people. Since then there has been an scandal after another disclosed. The thousands of little, petty officials are drawing big salaries for performing no service. They are now regarded as established institutions. This is the condition we have brought those two islands to, and now men who are close to the administration, are solemnly declaring over the country that the American flag never shall be pulled down in Cuba. That notwithstanding the fact that the good faith of this nation is pledged to mankind to give those people their independence, that we do not intend to give up that country."

J. K. WEATHERFORD ON EASTERN POLITICAL SITUATION.

Hon James K. Weatherford, of Albany, is very well known by not a few Lane county citizens as a man who does not easily get excited. His report on the political situation east of the Rocky mountains at a Democratic club meeting at Albany the other evening, as

reported by the Democrat, will prove interesting, at least to the many who know the man: "Hon J K Weatherford was present and gave a talk on his observations upon his recent trip east. Everything was ablaze with politics and there was speaking everywhere. In Minnesota there was great enthusiasm, 1100 delegates then returning to their homes from the state convention, confident that the state would go for Bryan. At Chicago at the national Democratic headquarters he found ex-Governor Stone in charge confident of Bryan's election. The indications in Chicago were emphatically Bryan for Illinois. In Chicago anywhere from 30,000 to 50,000, trusts, and imperialism everywhere, were driving men to the Democratic party. He passed through the coal region with its empty dinner pails. "Incidentally Mr Weatherford made some strong arguments in favor of expansion only by the consent of the people, as has been our policy in the past, and not through force, taking in a people that can never be assimilated. We want a government resting on all the people, not on one man like Mark Hanna. It is an interesting fact that the cost of the Philippine war, \$225,000,000 a year, is more than the entire annual resources of the Pacific coast states, and is more than the \$187,000,000 spent in the United States annually for education, with nothing to show for it; and the seeds sown are seeds of destruction."
