This bridge has a span of 200 feet and cost the county about \$13,000.

FOOTBALL PROSPECTS.

One Game Arranged to Be Played in Eugene So Far.

The present football season is not opening as auspiciously as it should for the U. O. Manager Goodrich is having a harder time trying to book games than ever before in the history of the sport. He has received a letter from the manager of the Albany college team stating that he will not be able to successfully conduct a team, and therefore cannot arrange a date, Oct. 20, as was expected.

The Salem Journal of yesterday, states that a team of the Capital City Athletic Club would play the U. O. Oct. 27, but letters received by Mr. Goodrich so far fail to confirm this. It is hoped this game will be arranged, as many good players are listed in the Salem team and the game would prove an interesting one.

Of course the big games, two with the Multnomah club and the California universities are still on, but none of them will be played in this city.

Coach Kaarsberg is keeping the men actively at work and the thorough drilling is having a good effect. Team play is improving rapidly. A number of the players are out for a few days, which has a slightly depressing effect, but this will soon be overcome, and all will be in their places again. Edwards, quarter, was laid out and will be off the gridiron for several days yet.

Scott, who took his place, was laid out yesterday, and may not be out for several days. Gorrell, the speedy end, may be out for a day or two. The second team men are filling in however, and the two teams line-up each night for rapid work. A good many will probably go to Portland to see the game Nov. 3.

GAME ARRANGED FOR.

Manager Goodrich closed arrangements this afternoon for a game October 27, with the Salem Athletic Club team, to be played in this city. From the long list of experienced players in the Salem club a contest close and exciting is assured. The Salem boys have the ambition to develop one of the best, if not the best team in the state, and will put up a strong and speedy battle. This will unquestionably be the best game to be seen in Eugene during the year.

Killed at Tacoma.

Joseph J. Kendall, of Albany, was struck by a train near Tacoma, Friday, and was taken to the Fanny Paddock hospital at Tacoma, where he died Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

Joseph Kendall was born in Linn county 35 years ago and made his home in Albany for many years, where he was rightly respected by all who knew him. He was a member of the Masonic and Workmen lodges of Albany, also of the Brotherhood of Railroad Firemen. In the latter two he carried insurance policies to the amount of \$3,500. Mr. Kendall has been employed as engineer and fireman on this coast for a number of years and was acting fireman on the work train running out of Tacoma.

Deceased leaves a wife and two children. The funeral took place in Albany today, the Masonic and Workmen lodges in charge, and the remains were laid to rest in the Masonic burial grounds.
