CARL SCHURZ ON "CONSENT OF THE GOVERNED."

"It is amazing with what lightness of mind our imperialists scoff at the most fundamental principle of Democracy, which is that 'governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed.' They flippantly talk as if they had disposed of the whole matter when they show that in some instances in our history the consent of the governed has not been formally asked or obtained. Will they please tell me from what source government does derive its just powers, if not from the consent of the governed? From divine right? That is absolutism. From the possession of the strongest fist? That is government by force. From the possession of the greatest wealth, the longest purse? That is plutocracy. From the privilege of birth? That is aristocracy.

"There remains, then, only the consent of the governed, meaning, as the authors of the Declaration of Independence no doubt intended it to mean, that the people, expressing the will of the majority in a manner prescribed by constitutions or laws made by themselves, shall have the decisive word as to what kind of government they are to have, who is to constitute that government, and what that government is to do—a government organically springing from, and responsible to the governed—or, as Lincoln expressed it, a government of, for and by the people."

The country is made aware of the fact that ex-President Harrison is yet on the turf through an interview given out for political purposes the other day. Of course Harrison predicts all kinds of evils should Bryan be elected.

Sir Thomas Lipton, of England, is somewhat of a hog himself. He claims that he practically owns all the pork in the United States. If Sir Thomas will look up the history of corners of food products in the United States for several years past he will find that not a few magnificent fortunes were dissipated in the hopeless task of attempting to control staple crop and food products.

It is not often a vice-presidential candidate receives the attention accorded Roosevelt. The New York Journal of October 6 has a large cartoon under the head, "This for vice-president." The cartoon shows the figure of a large baboon

sitting on the floor, with eyeglasses on nose, wearing military hat with skull and crossbones ornament on front. At his side a closed volume has the superscription, "My life by me." The open pages of a book in front are inscribed, "All Democrats are cowards." A pistol and hand mirror flank the open book.

The Portland postoffice is to be supplied with a phenomenally fast stamp cancelling machine. It will stamp, cancel, and count thirty thousand letters an hour. This is at the rate of five hundred a minute. This is a fast age. The postoffice seems able to keep up with the procession.

Little Rock is the largest city, having 38,307 people, an increase of 48 per cent in ten years. The next is Ft. Smith, 11,887, an increase of only 276 in ten years, then Pine Bluff with 11,496, the only cities above 5,000.
