POWERS TO ARBITRATE FOR CHINA.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—The United States government
has notified the powers of its acceptance of the Russian
proposal that an international arbitration board, consisting
of representatives of the great powers, shall be vested with
power to settle the Chinese difficulty.

All the powers are likely to accept places on the board
and bind themselves to concur in its findings.

CHINA MUST PUNISH RINGLEADERS.

TIENSIN, Oct. 13.—At a conference of the diplomatic
representatives held today it was decided without dissent
that the Chinese government had entirely failed to mete
out punishment to the ringleaders who were responsible
for the murder of missionaries and other foreigners and the
destruction of property owned by foreigners.

An identical note has been decided upon to be ad-
dressed to the Chinese government at once.

HOP MARKET FIRM.

BUSINESS MEN FOR BRYAN.

Hebrew Citizens' League Comes Out Strong for Democratic Leaders.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. Oct. 13.—The
Hebrew Citizens' League decided yes-
terday to support Bryan and Steven-
son. All of the leading Hebrews of
the city are members of the league,
which is a non-partisan organiza-
tion.

Four years ago eighty per cent of the
members voted for McKinley.

One hundred and fifty applications
for membership were received, and it
is said that by election day there will
be fully 1,000 Hebrews enrolled in the
league.

CITY COUNCIL.—An adjourned ses-
sion of the city council will be held at
the city hall tonight. It is generally
talked on the streets that J. S. Sullivan's
appointment as night watchman will
not be confirmed.

The 27th of this month will be an-
other Democratic day. Big meetings
will be held in all of the great cities of

which have not been seen. Hon. A. E.
Stevenson, the people's candidate for
vice-president, will be the principal
speaker at San Francisco that day.

Millions In It.

Klamath Falls Express.

The purchase of a half interest in the
big Klamath Irrigation canal by Hon.
H. E. Ankeny, the Jackson county
mining man and banker, will prove to
be the biggest benefit of anything that
has occurred in the county for years,
excepting of course, the building of the
Oregon Midland railway. Whether
Mr. Ankeny retains but a half interest
or becomes the sole owner will not
affect the enlarging of the ditch to a
canal, capable of supplying the neces-
sary water for irrigating the 65,000
acres of alfalfa and farming lands in
this valley.

"There's millions in it," and the
proof is not hard to adduce. Hay 30,-
000 acres of this land is turned from
sage brush to alfalfa land bearing
120,000 to 150,000 tons of hay annually.
Three or four years will suffice to
make the first million dollars of net
profit to the growers.

Price of Hops May Advance.

SALEM, Oct. 12.—John Carmichael, a
Salem hopbuyer, says that sales of hops
are now being made at 14½ cents, and
he expects soon to see a fulfillment of
his prediction made some time ago that
those who held for 15 cents would get
that price.

PARALYTIC STROKE.—About 1
o'clock this afternoon Peter Kyniston
a Blue River miner, suffered a para-
lytic stroke while on Williamette street.
He was taken the office of Dr. T. W.
Harris, and was shortly after able to
be assisted to his room. The stroke
has affected Mr. Kyniston's vocal
organs, and at the last report he was
still speechless.

ALBANY DEMOCRAT, Oct. 12: Mr. R. J.
Smith, of Princeton, left for home this
afternoon by way of the Lebanon
wagon road after a several days busi-
ness trip here. He reports business in
Crook county as excellent. Princeton
particularly is going ahead in fine
shape. Eight new buildings are going
up, one an \$8,000 hotel just being com-
pleted by Perry Poindester. It has 29
bed rooms and is a credit to the pro-
prietor and Crook county. Editor L.
N. Liggett has just let the contract for
a new \$1200 residence.

HIGH SCHOOL

Student Organization, Football Schedule, and Society Notes.

ASSOCIATION TO BE FORMED.

Tonight in the High School building,
the opening social event of the stu-
dents will take place. The football
team is to have a benefit and the ladies
and lassies are to have a social gather-
ing. The students also invite all their
friends to come out and have a pleas-
ant evening and incidentally encour-
age high school enterprise. Ice cream
and cake, candies and other good
things will be offered for sale and a
first class musical and literary program
will be given. A small admission fee
of 10 cents is to be charged, and all
proceeds are to go to the athletic
interests of the school.

The prospects for a good team are
very bright as most of the stars of last
year's Central and Geary teams are
in school and some excellent material
has been discovered among the
new men who have entered. Mr.
Edwards, the crack quarterback of
last year's varsity eleven, is the capa-
ble coach, and he is quite pleased with
the enthusiasm and good showing
made already.

The manager, Chas. Austin, has
already secured a date with the Cot-
tage Grove school team and is negoti-
ating with other teams. It is the
intention to play at least two and
possibly three games on the local
grounds, if the citizens of Eugene will
come to their support. It will require
a considerable guarantee, but our peo-
ple are strong admirers of the sport and
will no doubt turn out large audiences.

All student organizations have been
put upon a firm basis this year in
order that they may be in full har-
mony and that they may gain the
confidence of the public because of
their business methods.

A general organization of all the
students is on foot and the first steps
were taken yesterday, when the four
classes each elected four delegates to a
constitutional convention. This con-
vention has already organized with
Mr. Chas. Austin, of the tenth grade,
as president, and Miss Cora Wold, of
the twelfth grade, as secretary. They
are to hold a final session Monday and
report constitution and working plans
on the following day. The general
election will occur on Thursday. On
Wednesday two political conventions
will be held to nominate rival tickets
and the contest promises to be a warm
one.

In the meantime each of the grades
is also organizing with full set of offi-
cers, colors, yells, etc., and enthusiasm
will run high next week. These class
organizations and all other clubs, such
as athletic, musical, debating and
academics, will be affiliated in the
"Students' Association of the Eugene
High School," and under its control.

There is also some talk of instituting
a secret fraternity if a charter can be
secured, and thus become linked with
other high schools in this and other
states.

Among other enterprises talked of is
the publication of a High School paper.
The students are very much alive this
year and propose to make the name of
their school known and respected both
at home and abroad.

The indications are that the total
enrollment for the first school month
will reach 175, about 30 more than the
entire enrollment of last year's first
semester.

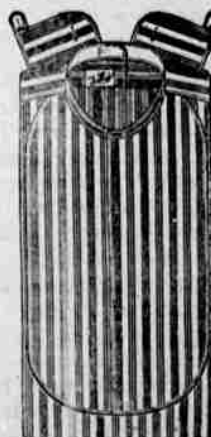
