OLD KENTUCKY.

T. J. Stites, of Albany, who is visiting in Kentucky, the land of bourbon and political assassinations, writes a very interesting letter to the Albany Democrat. We give an extract in regard to the political situation in that contested state which ordinarily rolls up Democratic majorities, yet cast its electoral vote, except once, for McKinley four years ago.

"The Democratic central committee here claim the state sure for Bryan and Beckham. Political feeling here is intensely bitter. I have been to the Courier-Journal office twice to see Mr. Watson, but he was not in. He lives in the country and does much of his writing there. I heard Debs speak at Music Hall Friday night and Mr. Bryan spoke here last night to the largest and most enthusiastic audience I have ever seen. His reception here was phenomenally cordial and hearty. The great auditorium was crowded to suffocation with 6000 of Kentucky's men and women, and twice that many on the outside. It was Mr. Bryan's seventeenth speech for the day, and yet he spoke with unusual force and vigor. When he said that he felt much greater interest in this campaign as a citizen than as a presidential candidate the vast audience as one person rose to their feet and shouted themselves hoarse at the expression of a sentiment so unselfish and patriotic."

A MONSTER AMONG BIRDS.

In a very interesting article on birds in a recent number of the London Spectator the writer says: "Good temper and good fellowship in society, a personal affection to each other to which the beasts offer no parallel, industry and independence, intense devotion and foresight in tending their young, with other very human and engaging traits of character, must all be credited to the race of birds."

"Among those kindly and simple natures the cuckoo is a monster. Let there be no mistake on this subject. He unites in his life and character, from the egg to the adult bird, practices and principles to which the whole race of warm blooded animals offers no parallel. He is an outrage on the moral law of bird life, something so flagrant and so utterly foreign to the way of thought of these kindly beings that if he did not exist he would not be conceivable. It is not merely that he is a supplanter and a changeling. His whole nature is so evil that in the world of birds he is an incarnation of the principle of ill, an embodiment of vice which would if understood or adopted by other birds put an end to the existence of the race."

ANOTHER JERYLL AND HYDE CASE.

An Elizabethport, New Jersey, bank has a sensation in the disappearance of a trusted bank clerk. The young man played the races, with a woman to aid him, and in four years succeeded in tapping the bank for \$109,000 on an \$820 salary.

The astonishing thing is that the bank officials had not the least information about his burning up money in the tenderloin district until after his disappearance last month. In fact he was considered a model young man. "Dr. Jekyll" and "Mr. Hyde" find apt illustrations in every-day life.

What is familiarly known as the endless chain scheme of obtaining money has been declared illegal by the postal authorities, and excluded from the mails. For the past two or three years dozens of these propositions have been worked throughout the country until they have become a nuisance.

Rather a pathetic case comes from New York. A Russian emigrant had made enough money to send for his wife and five children. One of them, a girl of eight years, is idiotic and the officials could not admit her. The father will take the defective girl back to Russia, the family remaining.
