IT'S HONEST BELIEF.

The Oregonian Said Hard Things About McKinley.

Although now a hearty supporter of McKinley, the Oregonian was not always thus. On June 22, 1899, it gave its views of his administration and sounded the alarm as to what dangers might befall the nation should he be continued in the president's chair, as follows:

"The McKinley administration has made most disgraceful appointments to office at the behest of unscrupulous politicians. It has betrayed the civil service to the spoils men, paralyzed the organization of the army, violated its pledges as to currency reform, humiliated its most efficient servants, and discredited American intelligence and valor in the eyes of the civilized world.

"In a time of courage it has quailed. In a time of decision it has hesitated. In a time of action it has delayed. In a time of honest dealing it has faltered and equivocated. Its policy has been to drift; its aim has been to placate everybody, however unworthy, and cater to everything, however mischievous; its course has been to sacrifice any and every vital interest of the nation on the altar of partisan and personal politics.

"What is to become of American valor and diplomacy if they are to be shuffled and beat about for four years more of such administration? What is to come of the army if it is to be taken more and more from military men and turned over to ward politicians? What is to become of the new dependencies, if they are to be delivered over to the spoils men, as Alaska has been delivered over? What is to become of the gold standard in the next panic if we have a president who can refuse nothing to Wolcott, Stewart and Jones of Nevada? What is to become of the treasury itself, now that Reed has gone from the safety-valve in congress, if we are to have in the White House the personification of complacency? What is to become of our young men if the doors of public service are to be closed to the capable and ambitious, and open only to the benchmen and bosses?"

CALLS NAMES.

Here is a very convincing argument from the Eugene Register. And it is meant to be offensive to the majority of Lane county voters, who gave Bryan 800 majority in 1896. These "bolter than thou" people appear to have forgotten former election returns. The Register says:

"The man who votes for Bryan this year, on taking a political inventory of himself, is unable to decide whether he is a Democrat, Populist or Socialist."

IN DARKNESS.

Cup Defenders Are Not Idle.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Considerable interest is taken in naval circles in Washington, says a Herald special, as to the characteristics of the new defender to be built to compete with the yacht Sir Thomas Lipton will send to the United States to lift the America's cup.

Rear-Admiral Hitchcock, chief constructor, said:

"The time intervening between the last race for the America's cup and the now contemplated has not been lost by our designers. The 70-foot 'Yankee class,' which were built by the Harreshoff Company, and which were so thoroughly tried in the many competitions during the last summer, have kept the minds of yachtsmen and designers alert to take advantage of any possible improvements.

"If when the trials of Shamrock No. 1 and 2 are held, it will be found that the last boat is better than the first, I believe our designers will be able to improve the Columbia or build an improved Columbia which shall successfully defend the cup.

Mrs J. W. Lingo.

The Junction City Bulletin has the following obituary of Mrs. J. W. Lingo, who died near Junction City Saturday, October 13, of dropsy, after a lingering illness:

"Mrs. Lingo was born in Pike county, Illinois, May 5, 1859, and started across the plains with her parents in 1847, her mother dying en route, in the Grand Ronde valley, on the Powder river, where she was buried. Her father, James Harpole, settled in Marion county, this state, where he resided until March, 1854, when he moved to Umpqua (now Douglas) county, on a farm about four miles from Oakland. In the fall of 1855 Mr. Harpole moved to Lane county and located about 3 1/2 miles southwest of Junction City. J. M. Harpole made two trips to Illinois after coming to Oregon, the first time in 1851 and then in 1853, when he married Mrs. Lingo, mother of J. W. Lingo.

"Mrs. J. W. Lingo was the mother of fourteen children, eleven of whom are living."
