REFRESHING ASSURANCE.

The Portland Telegram is not polite enough to conceal its opinion about the recent settlement of the coal miners strike, but comments in a way that must humiliate intelligent Republican readers. The supreme contempt which the evening edition of the Oregonian affects for the intelligence of the people, and the childlike faith reposed in Chairman Hanna, of the Republican national committee, are truly refreshing. The Telegram says:

"Mr Hanna knew what he was talking about when he said last Saturday that the strike would be settled this week. He had not been in conference with the railroad and coal mine magnates for nothing. He knew what would happen before he started on his western tour. If an election had not been close at hand the miners would not have won their victory, at least not for a long, cold season; and perhaps their leaders took the political contest into consideration when they timed their strike."

"McKinley would have been elected in spite of the strike, but there is no doubt that it was costing him heavily. Now, if the coal barons will reduce the price of coal for three weeks, the Republican situation will be still more improved, though it doesn't particularly need it."

The Telegram unwittingly tells the truth. But how can intelligent voters cast their votes for a president controlled and engineered by such a man as Hanna, and supported by the coal barons? Certainly those coal barons should "reduce the price of coal for three weeks" until McKinley is elected. Then they can boast it as high as they please so far as Chairman Hanna and the Telegram perfection-of-simplicity editor are concerned.

HEAVY LUMBER SHIPMENTS.

The Southern Pacific railroad company is doing big business in lumber shipments these days. A sample could have been seen by a spectator at the Eugene depot last evening about 9 o'clock. A lumber train passed through for Texas points loaded with Oregon fir, or pine as it is known to the trade.

The train consisted exclusively of lumber cars, 24 in number, with a caboose. They were loaded from the Coburg mills on the McKenzie, and the Curtis mills with Santiam river production. Estimating 20,000 feet to a car the train carried 480,000 feet of lumber, enough to keep a good sized mill saving the better part of two months.

This lumber business is in its infancy. The Southern Pacific railroad wants the long haul, and is using its timber lands to supply the lumber that finds a ready market in the south and southwest.

MAKES MUCH OF LITTLE.

Four years ago William Colvig, a Jacksonville lawyer, was a candidate for presidential elector on the Bryan ticket. This year he is announced for McKinley, and the Oregonian, especially among the Republican papers, makes much of the almost lone convert. The Klamath Falls Express, published in the district of which Colvig was formerly prosecuting attorney, aptly remarks:

"Nearly every issue of the Oregonian for a week contained such headlines as these, 'Why Colvig is for McKinley,' 'Why Colvig is Against Bryan,' 'Why Colvig is for Sound Money,' etc. Indeed, why Colvig at all? Because a man has at sometime in his career been a prosecuting attorney does it necessarily prove that later in life he shall not have an ossified brain?"

The rank and file of the Republican party cannot but be ashamed of the leading paper in the state, which claims to represent that party. The Oregonian will not be decent—it cannot be decent. A late issue insults its readers by referring to the candidate for president of about half the voters of Oregon, and 6,500,000 of the United States, as "Windjammer Jawsmith Bryan." Mr Bryan is making a very thorough canvass of disputed states in the East. He is doing no more than was done by those great Republicans, Abraham Lincoln and James G. Blaine. There is little conscience about the Oregonian editorial office, and less shame.

THE BAD BOY AT WORK.

Almost Caused a Panic by Tying a Can to a Horse's Tail.

An Oregon City dispatch of Saturday says:

"A boy named Boylan created a panic and caused serious damage this morning by tying an empty five-gallon coal oil can to the tail of a vagrant cayuse at the head of upper Seventh street. The frightened animal rushed frantically down that thoroughfare, entered a harness shop, to beat a hasty retreat, was prevented from entering two grocery stores and a barber shop by the efforts of the proprietors and bystanders; ran against a pair of horses hitched to a grocery delivery wagon, causing a runaway that wrecked the wagon and ruined the harness."

"This stampede caused the horses of another delivery wagon in the immediate vicinity to become frightened, resulting in wrecking the vehicle. The horse continued in his course down the hill, and it was later reported that the horse was lying in a dying condition below town from the effects of the stampede. At the request of the proprietor of one of the wrecked vehicles, this afternoon, this young man took the wagon to a shop to have the necessary repairs made."

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900. It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov. 1, 1900, and advertising commence immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
