BRYAN INVADERS ENEMY'S COUNTRY.

Wins Applause From Thousands in the Lairs of Platt and Odell.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 18.—There is not a man on the special train which is bearing William Jennings Bryan through the state who is not elated over the enthusiastic reception accorded the Democratic candidate thus far on his tour. In districts hitherto hostile to Democracy there were waving flags, booming cannon and shouting multitudes.

This side of the Bronx is recognized as Republican country. It is doubtful, however, if any candidate would have been greeted by larger crowds than was William Jennings Bryan yesterday. Dewey could not do it were he candidate for the presidency. Theodore Roosevelt did not do it in 1898.

BRYAN MUCH PLEASED.

Bryan himself appeared greatly pleased with the demonstrations at the various points where speeches were made, and he retired tonight contented with his day's work. He made fourteen speeches during the day, the last one being before a crowd here in Albany which completely overshadowed all the rest.

At Yonkers there was a speech on trusts and their evils. It was made from a truck before 10,000 people. This was the opening gun, at Tarrytown there was the sound of songs and the roll of drums. Here Bryan again took up the topic of the trusts.

At Sing Sing he referred satirically to the full dinner-pail provided the prisoners by the state and their consequent contentment.

IN THE ENEMY'S COUNTRY.

Two thousand enthusiastic Democrats gathered at Peekskill, the former home of Chauncey M. Depew. There were bombs, flags and cannon at Cold Springs, with gunnery in gaudy uniforms dotting the hillsides.

From Fishkill Bryan went over the river to invade Newburgh, the home of Benjamin B. Odell. It was the invasion of a conqueror. Here in the very lair of Plattism and Odellism the orator tendered the Democratic candidate showed how deeply the people are aroused by the campaign.

WOULD HAVE SCARED DEPEW.

Poughkeepsie was a revelation which would have frightened the wite out of Depew and shaken the faith of even Joe Manly. Five thousand people faced Bryan from hillside, roofs and windows. Everybody was astonished to find 3,000 enthusiasts at Hudson.

To these Bryan made a rear platform speech which was punctuated and paraphrased by the sound of cannon.

At Troy, the home of Senator Murphy, ten thousand people lined the streets and as many as could stand the terrific pressure were jammed into the opera house. While Mr. Bryan and Mr. Bulger spoke to the opera house audience Mayor Jones of Toledo harangued the crowd outside. When Bryan finally reappeared he was fairly mobbed by the enthusiastic crowd.

A crowd of 2,500 came out at Mechanicsville, and Coburn almost emptied itself to do honor to the Democratic candidate.

CLOSED DAY AT ALBANY.

At 6:40 p. m. Mr. Bryan's train rolled into the depot at the state capital. After dinner the Bryan party was driven to the opera house, which was crowded from footlights to the front door with the best Democracy and much of the best Republicanism of the capital. There was no uncertain note in the cheering which greeted Bryan as he arose and stepped to the front of the stage. In this uproar John Boyd Thatcher, Judge Gray and Chief Justice Parker took a modest part.

Bryan finished his day's work with a speech to 5,000 listeners in front of the opera house.

AN UNUSUAL CASE.

Three Prominent Eastern Oregon Lawyers on Trial for Subornation of Perjury.

The case of the State vs. D. W. Heclean, Walter G. Hayes and J. V. Luthers is on trial before Judge Robert Eakin at Enterprise, Walla Walla county.

On the executive order of Gov. Geer, Dennis Whitmore has been released from imprisonment and escorted to Enterprise to give his testimony against these three lawyers who are prominent members of the profession in Eastern Oregon. Whitmore is serving a term in the penitentiary for perjury. On his trial he testified the defendants above named paid him to perjure himself and Judge Eakin issued an order for their arrest in the courtroom. His statement was that they paid him about \$20 to swear falsely. Judge Bennett, of The Dalles, is defending the men.

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900. It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov. 1, 1900, and advertising commence immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
