OLD MISSION GROUND.

There is pathos in the announcement that a distillery will be built on the garden spot of the old Methodist mission at The Dalles. The mission was founded for the purpose of Christianizing Indians, by self-sacrificing men and women in the late 'forties.' The mission work was not particularly successful, owing to the averseness of the wild Indian to submit to any kind of civilization except that brought in bottles.

Yet that does not detract from the glory that belongs to the pioneer missionaries. They endured the perils and hardships of the wildest of isolated frontier life, and through their influence and efforts the North Pacific coast states were saved to the Union.

THE PASTOR'S FAREWELL.

Rev Jesse Marable in a farewell sermon as pastor of the Mount Olive Baptist African church, Hackensack, attacked the congregation, saying:

"What is the use of a preacher here if you don't listen to God's word? Your church is now upside down, and I hope God will come and root out the devil."

"Preaching the gospel has no more effect on you than talking to a stone wall. If an angel came down from heaven to be your pastor he wouldn't stay here six months. The devil is a bigger man than I am, and that's why my converts left and are going down to a demon's hell."

THE FULL DINNER PAIL.

"Mr Hanna has repeatedly declared that the full dinner pail argument is sufficient to lead the working masses to vote for the reelection of Mr McKinley. He holds that so long as the dinner pail is full the working man has no interest in inquiring into the methods by which Mr Rockefeller and other trust monopolists pile up millions of dollars in profits every year."

"To this sort of argument, which is much older than Mr Hanna, or Mr Rockefeller, Abraham Lincoln replied in a speech as pregnant with homely truth as an Aesop fable. This speech was delivered

September 17, 1859, at Cincinnati: "I hold, if the Almighty had ever made a set of men that should do all of the eating and none of the work, he would have made them with mouths only and no hands; and if he had ever made another class that he intended should do all the work and none of the eating, he would have made them without mouths and with all hands. But, inasmuch as he has chosen to men the way he has, if anything is proved it is that those hands and mouths are to be co-operative through life and are not to be interfered with. That they are to go forth and improve their condition in the inherent right given to mankind directly by the maker."

AGAINST JEWS AND AMERICANS.

The will of J B Clayton, son of the late member of the British parliament of that name, has just been probated.

By it he leaves his two daughters a fortune of £144,000, (\$720,000), with the curious provision that the money is to be payable only if they attain the age of thirty-five years without marrying either a citizen of the United States or a Jew.

The reason for this proviso is not given.

MRS. BRYAN OR MRS. ROOSEVELT

Will Be Next President of Daughters of Revolution Society.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Whichever way the presidential election goes may decide who is to be the next president general of the Daughters of the American Revolution, says a special from Washington to the Herald. It has been decided by many of the leading members to ask either Mrs Roosevelt or Mrs Bryan to fill the position. Neither is at present a member of the organization, but both are eligible, and one of the board of managers has just made the statement that within the last week papers have been made out for the admission of both to the ranks of the Daughters.

If McKinley and Roosevelt are elected then the choice will fall on Mrs Roosevelt, and if the democrats win, the honor will be conferred upon Mrs Bryan. The election will not take place until next February.

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900. It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices heretofore will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov 1, 1900, and advertising commence immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
