Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900. It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov 1, 1900, and advertising commences immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
