**DEPEW VS DEPEW.**

In 1900 Forgets What He Said in 1898.

IN 1898,

Senator Chauncey M. Depew, in interview in the Chicago Times-Herald (McKinley organ), May 22, 1898,

"If we should keep the Philippine islands," said Mr. Depew, "we would reverse the traditions of this government from its foundation. We would open up a new line of policy. Let us see what that would mean. In the first place it would mean the establishment of a military government over possibly 10,000,000 of people 6,000 miles from us; it would mean the increase of our navy to the proportions of the navies of Europe. \*\*\*

What else does a world-wide policy mean to us? It means a centralization which would change materially the relations of the United States to the Federal government.

"The control of these popular colonies would be centered at Washington, and we should have a centralization of power far beyond what the old Federalists ever dreamed of. You cannot have empire without all its attributes, and that means a practical revolution of our form of government, and an abandonment of the beliefs which the fathers held when they established this government in 1776."

IN 1900,

Senator Chauncey M. Depew, at Chicago, Oct. 2, 1900,

"The terror of imperialism is a ghost. I mean American imperialism. It has been tried for 100 years. It was practiced by Washington; it was tested upon an enormous scale by Jefferson; it was put in operation by Monroe, Jackson, Polk and Pierce. All gave it their sanction; all of them, to the great glory and power of our country, pursued the same path of imperialism which is now being trod by President McKinley."

It is not probable that Alford, the defaulting New York bank teller, will be punished. Naturally the bank is more anxious to get its money back, a part at least, than to make the smooth defaulter wear striped clothes.

The Republican papers that complain about Bryan papers quoting the utterances of Abraham Lincoln should remember that they, the Republican papers, have not dared to quote Abraham Lincoln during the campaign.

The Oregonian is happy. The mayor of Dufur, Wasco county, [200 inhabitants], a former Silver Republican, has written the editor recanting and renouncing Bryan. The Oregonian frames the letter

with a border, and gives it very desirable two-column width space in the middle of a page. Converts must be scarce when the big paper gives so much space and prominence to the mayor of a bunch-grass hamlet whose scattered inhabitants never know when Sunday comes.

President McKinley's supporters no longer have cause to complain of an apathetic campaign. The way New York voters have registered, and the way they turned out to hear Bryan have caused dismay where confidence once held sway.

The Telegram says the Oregon market is flooded with cheap vinegar manufactured from eastern distillery refuse. It can be laid down in Portland for from six to eight cents per gallon, consequently undercuts the pure, healthful vinegar made from Oregon apples.

The Oregonian treats Bryan as Tom Paine did the Bible—prints extracts from speeches that might be modified by the contexts. Still the extracts read well except to trust-monopoly advocates. Bryan may or may not have made the assertions printed by the Oregonian. This is a Mark Hanna campaign—to win by any means—and Oregonian politics may well be taken with suspicion.

Public sentiment would not for an instant tolerate the acquisition of territory on European shores other than for some purpose such as a coaling station. Yet the McKinley administration would go nearly three times as far, across the vast Pacific ocean, and hold vast Asiatic territory the inhabitants of which would not be made citizens under any circumstances, or by any political party.

**Notice to Taxpayers.**

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900. It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov. 1, 1900, and advertising commences immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.

**Transport Service.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—After a full discussion of the subject with Quartermaster-General Ludington and Colonel Bird, of his office, Secretary Root has rejected the proposition to have the military transport business between this country and Cuba and Porto Rico conducted by a merchant line of steamers on these routes, instead of by regular army transports, as at present. It was found that the expense was practically the same under both systems and that otherwise there would be no special advantage in transferring the work to private steamship companies. One result of the decision to continue the government transport service is the establishment of a regular semi-monthly transport on each of the two routes.
