MORE MUD FOR WILLAMETTE STREET.

Some people are hauling mud off Willamette street, but the City of Eugene sorely and contentedly continues to haul the making of mud, loam and sand, into the old street car track. It is too bad that our principal business street cannot be improved with the best material obtainable, crushed rock.

The round rock will not stand heavy traffic. The result is that Willamette street is rougher than many of the ordinary country roads. The city council certainly should heed public sentiment in this matter. The business men, who are interested in this street more particularly, are against the use of gravel almost to the man.

OUR SULU POSSESSIONS.

The Sulu group of islands are about one hundred and fifty in number, and are situated south of the Philippines and north of Borneo. They are included in the Philippine purchase from Spain. They have been under Mohammedan rule for many centuries. Spain hired the rulers to recognize her suzerainty and paid them a stipulated sum yearly. Spain never conquered them, or exercised any authority whatever over them. Slavery and polygamy have been institutions in the Sulu group, and among the Moros of the island of Mindanao.

Under the contract made by President McKinley with the Sultan of Sulu, the Sultanry is incorporated into his empire. Without acquiring any rights beyond a nominal suzerainty and an agreement to float our flag over the Sultan's palace, the president paid the Sultan and dattos a bribe of ten thousand Mexican dollars, and agreed to pay them monthly salaries forever afterwards. He also pledged the United States, in his contract or treaty, to defend the Sultan and his subjects against the interference of any foreign power. The United States, under the agreement, collects no revenue from the islands nor in any wise participates in the government of the islands. In fact, the Sultan of Sulu is an absolute monarch over his dominion as is the Sultan of Turkey over his, or the Czar of Russia.

For the privilege of a nominal suzerainty, and of disgracing our flag by having it float over the palace, harems and slave pens of the Sulu islands, President McKinley has pledged the government of the United States to pay from

the taxes collected from the people salaries to the Sultan and his dattos amounting to \$9,120 per year, while the annual sum paid by the Spanish government was only \$6,300. And the thirteenth amendment does not reach the Sulu. Witness article 10 of the treaty with the Sultan, which reads as follows:

"Any slave in the archipelago of Sulu shall have the right to purchase freedom by paying to the master the usual market price."

Lincoln emancipated the slave. His successor floats the flag over slave territory!

LEGITIMATE EXPANSION.

"Where the American flag has been planted by the heroism of our army and navy and by the treaty of peace with Spain, it must ever remain, but it should not float as a symbol of oppression. Where the flag goes the constitution and laws of the Union must go with it. The first lesson of these laws is the right of the people to govern themselves; but instead of obeying the law we have an imperialistic colonial policy that is today oppressing Porto Rico to starvation, and that is making costly and bloody war in the Philippines, that could be ended by conceding the right of the people to rule themselves under the sovereignty and just restraints and protection of the United States."

"Expansion is a legitimate and time-honored Democratic policy; imperialism is a seething fountain of oppression and an appalling perversion of every attribute of our free institutions."

President Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers organization, gives out a statement that the striking coal miners won their victory, with the exception of a few conceded points, in 39 days.

AN ASYLUM INCIDENT.

Attendants Bathed and Prepared to Care for a Woman Who Happened to Be Sane.

SALEM, Oct. 26.—The monotony of life at a big institution like the state insane asylum is sometimes relieved by a real good joke, and one of these, which transpired not more than 40 years ago, has escaped outside the walls.

The sheriff of one of the counties arrived at the asylum with an imbecile child, being assisted in the care of the child by a woman who is a native of a foreign country, and cannot yet "talk United States," so as to be understood. The sheriff took his charge to the receiving ward, the woman accompanying. Attendants thinking woman and child were both patients, proceeded to follow the usual rule. They hustled the woman to the bathroom, had her undressed and soaked into the tub before the real facts in the case were ascertained. The woman had vigorously and vociferously protested against the system of free baths imposed upon her, but her language failed upon unappreciative ears—that were unable to digest its sounds.

The sheriff's anxiety on account of the nonappearance of his assistant resulted in the early discovery of her enforced abnegation, and her release from further restraint.

University Observatory.

The attention of the GUARD has been called to the condition in which the abandoned State University observatory on Skinner's Butte is allowed to remain. There are no windows or doors remaining in the building, access being free. The white plastered walls have been decorated and written upon in a vile manner. The butte is quite an attraction on pleasant days, especially to strangers who may be sojourning in the city, and naturally few fail to enter the observatory building.

The city authorities or regents of the University should have the observatory boarded up the open doors and windows. It is a vile offense against public decency.

Died.

Junction City Times, October 27: "James M. Butler died in Lombard, Montana, October 6, aged 58, of heart trouble. He was a brother of J. J. Butler, of this city. In an early day James Butler owned one of the best wheat farms in this section and received \$10,000 cash for his farm. He left a widow and a large family of grown children. One daughter is in Chicago, one in Portland, two sons in Pendleton, one son in Wendling and the rest of the family are at home in Montana."

The deceased was well known by Eugene old timers. "Jimmy" but for one unfortunate habit, was an excellent citizen. That eventually cost him his farm and a leg below the knee.

THE \$700,000 ABSCONDER

Probably Under Surveillance With the Object of Securing Return of Part of Money.

New York, Oct. 26.—The Evening World says:

"Development this morning indicate that the whereabouts of Cornelius L. Alvord, the absconding note-teller of the First National Bank, are known both to his attorneys and the bank officials. That no warrant for his arrest has been asked is due to the efforts of his friends. Negotiations are now on with the bank officials in their behalf that will lead it to be restored within a few days of almost half the amount stolen. Alvord's arrest would be an immediate bar to restitution on his part. In the meantime the man, who is said by intimate friends to be in his house at Mt. Vernon, and by others to be somewhere in the vicinity, is under close surveillance by detectives. His escape is an impossibility."

Alvord is said to have had an enormous amount of ready cash when he took his final departure from the bank. This, with his real estate holdings, several blocks of securities, his wife's diamonds, his horses and livery and his interest in several New York business concerns, are under consideration in the negotiations between Alvord's friends and those from whom he stole. One of the absconder's friends assert that Alvord's holdings, when realized on, will make him only \$100,000 to the bad on the amount of his defalcation."

M. E. Church Dedicated.

Cottage Grove Leader.

A large congregation assembled at the elegant new M. E. church last Sunday to witness the dedication of the new building. Elder Ford, of Eugene, preached the dedicatory sermon in his plain and forcible style, holding the close attention of the vast throng for an hour. It was then announced that the church indebtedness of some \$550 must be raised before the building could be formally dedicated. Donations were then called for and more than the entire amount was raised in less than thirty minutes, thus again proving the wonderful liberality of the good people of Cottage Grove. Religious services were held in the afternoon and evening at which the large and commodious building was well filled.

The encounter was the outgrowth of a game of cards, and the complaining witness was struck with a rock. The culprits immediately left town but were caught at Shady Point by Deputy Sheriff Chas. Parrott.

After hearing the evidence Justice Robinson fined Brown \$50 for assault and Leonard \$30 for carrying a concealed weapon. Both fines were promptly paid.

A Sample of Bluster.

The following from Chicago gives a sample of the republican blustering this year:

J. J. Townsend, a stock broker, came up with \$50,000 today to bet Henry C. Payne that Bryan will receive as many electoral votes as he did in 1896. Mr. Payne, vice chairman of the republican national committee, said yesterday he would bet 2 to 1 that Bryan would not have as many as four years ago, when he had 176. This morning he said he did not have money enough to cover Townsend's money, but would try and get it. A dozen men, each with a roll as big as an elephant's foot, kept calling on Mr. Payne and he was kept busy explaining how he did not have any money. It was an embarrassing spectacle.

Vice Chairman Johnson returned to democratic headquarters today after a trip of investigation through Ohio.

"I talked with many leading democrats in the state and they all had the same story to tell," said Mr. Johnson. "They are all confident that they will carry the state for Mr. Bryan. Senator Foraker's prediction yesterday that the republicans would carry the state by 100,000, provoked audible mirth among the Ohio democrats, principally as this prediction was made soon after Mr. Foraker was yelled down by a Cleveland audience and not allowed to speak."

"Governor Roosevelt received a good reception at Cleveland, but at other points in the state his audiences were neither large nor enthusiastic. The followers of Mayor Jones, of Toledo, will, with a few exceptions, vote for Mr. Bryan. I was unable to learn that anyone who voted for Jones for governor intended to vote for Mr. McKinley."

Notice to Taxpayers.

EUGENE, Oregon, Oct. 16, 1900.

It has been the custom and requirement of the law for the sheriff of the county to serve tax warrants for delinquent taxes on the property of the delinquent taxpayer—but owing to the passage of a new law such notices hereafter will not be served or posted on delinquent property, but a certificate of levy will be filed with the county clerk, and then the customary notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes will be published in one of the county papers. The levy will be made Nov. 1, 1900, and advertising commences immediately thereafter. Taxpayers in order to save expense of levy and advertising should pay their taxes at once.
